- Robinson's Bay Beach Lifeguards on-duty from 12:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., off street parking available.
- Sandy Beach Lifeguards on-duty from 12:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., on street parking only.
- Rocky Beach No lifeguards on-duty, limited off street parking available.
- Nocomo Beach No lifeguards on-duty, off street parking available.
- Linwood Beach No lifeguards on-duty, no off street parking

Northome Bridge Project & Deephaven Beach Restroom Project

Northome Bridge Project Update – After receiving funding through the State of Minnesota in the amount of \$750,000 for the reconstruction of the Northome Bridge, plans and specifications have been submitted to the State for their review and bids are expected to be received in late July or early August. Street Improvement Plan

This year's Street Resurfacing Schedule includes Carson Road, W. Easton Road, Eastwood Drive, Hamilton Avenue, and Maplewood Road. This is the 6th year of the Street Resurfacing Plan as the City of Deephaven is focusing more attention and financial resources to the repair of City streets. The City has spent \$3,859,947 resurfacing city streets from 2015-2020. If you are interested in knowing more about the 2021 Street Improvement Project, a meeting will be held at 5:00 p.m. on July 19th at Deephaven City Hall to review the project in more detail.

<u>Street Overlay Improvement Schedule</u> – The following 2022-2025 street overlay schedule may be delayed or re-prioritized depending on the availability of city funding or the comparative

condition of each street:

2022 – Day Lane, Highland Avenue – the Pines, Hooper Lake Road, Jericho Road, Lake Avenue (West of Talton), Leroy Street, Lowell Street, Maple Ridge Road, Monaltrie Avenue (North of Lake), and Therese Street

2023 – Dale Avenue, Manor Road, Ramsey Road, Sibley Avenue, Walden Lane, Walden Road, and Walden Trail

2024 – Circle Drive, Heathcote Drive, Heathcote Lane, and Heathcote Road



For those residents with swimming pools, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency has the following recommendations regarding the discharge of swimming pool or hot tub water:

- Once the water is free of chlorine, the water should be directed onto a vegetated surface to encourage infiltration,
- The discharge should not flow onto any other persons' property, the city street, or create nuisance conditions.
- If the discharge flow is to occur across bare soil areas, care should be taken to prevent soil erosion. This can be done in several ways. The flow rate can be reduced to prevent erosion by the use of a small diameter hose, or additional piping or hose can be placed over the erosive area to prevent soil/water contact, and/or sod can lie in the bare area.
- Chlorination must be stopped at least three days prior to discharge.

- Chlorinated water should NEVER be discharged to any surface water such as a storm sewer, ditch, lake or wetland.
- Swimming pool or hot tub water should NEVER be discharged into the sanitary sewer. This could potentially cause of sewer backup into neighboring homes.

Illicit Discharges

The City has a program to detect and prevent illicit discharges (oil, paint, fertilizer, pet waste, grass clippings, etc.) from entering the city's storm sewer system, ditches, wetlands, or lakes. If you observe an illicit discharge, call 911.

Discharges from sump pumps and foundation drains into the sanitary sewer system are also prohibited. If you observe an illicit sanitary sewer discharge, call City Hall at 952-474-4755.

Mowing, Junk Cars, Boats & Trailers

Please be a respectful neighbor and make sure that your lawn is properly mowed and free of noxious weeds, and free from the unsightly storage of junk cars, boats and trailers. Deephaven residents are typically very conscientious about the appearance of their property and in being a "good neighbor".

Please remember that the City does have specific requirements on long grass and the storage of junk cars, boats & trailers as shown below:

Section 535.04 (z) – the length of grasses commonly used in lawn areas including blue grass, fescue or rye grass blends of similar grasses shall not exceed eight (8) inches in length, excluding grasses on steep slopes or adjoining ponds, wetlands and lakes.

Section 535.04 (t) - The parking, storing, or keeping on any public or private property any motorized vehicle, including boats and trailers, which (1) has a broken, missing or defective part that is necessary for normal operation thereof; (2) is stored on blocks, jacks or other supports; or (3) does not display a license or displays a license that is 60 days or more past its required renewal date, excluding those vehicles kept within a fully enclosed garage or other building and impounded vehicles held by the City.

Help Stop the Spread of Aquatic Invasive Species

You can help protect your favorite lake from aquatic invasive species (AIS) by following these three simple steps while boating:

- **Clean** before leaving a lake, boaters should clean all visible plants and other debris from all equipment (motors, jet skis, trailers, paddles, etc)
- Drain drain any water from the boat and keep drain plugs out
- **Dry** wipe everything dry

Disposing of unwanted bait in the trash also helps prevent the spread of invasive species.

Another way to protect your lake from AIS is by looking for invasive species when you are on or in the water. While the MCWD and its partners regularly monitor lakes for AIS, watchful residents can provide an extra layer of protection. By keeping an eye out for AIS, you can help catch any new infestation early and improve the chances for successful management.

MCWD has an early detection guide book that will give you the tools you need to identify what's invasive and what's native. The book is free and available either online at www.minnehahacreek.org/early-detectors or at the MCWD office at 15320 Minnetonka Boulevard in Minnetonka.

Help Keep Our Water Clean

- Minimize the use of fertilizers and other lawn chemicals
- Keep leaves and grass clippings out of the street
- Redirect rooftop runoff from hard surfaces such as streets & driveways to vegetated areas and lawns
- Plant native vegetation to reduce lawn watering
- Properly dispose of oil, antifreeze, cleaners, and other household chemicals
- Do not flush old medicines down the toilet.

Something new at City Hall. The Council will be adding an additional Police Officer to our force in 2022, or perhaps earlier. As we begin our budget discussions for the coming year, we are hoping to accomplish some shift flexibility and to provide additional training opportunities for our officers without straining our current roster. The department is also planning Deephaven's version of National Night Out again this year. Many of you have welcomed the opportunity to chat with our officers, meet your new neighbors and say 'hi' to old friends in the past, and I would like to see that opportunity happen again this summer.

The Council also approved a new flooring mat for the warming house at Thorpe. Tony Jewett and the Park Committee chose a product currently being used at the Hopkins Skating Center and we are anxious to have it installed before the skating season.

The Bathrooms by the Beach project is moving along nicely. Plans are on the web site and we hope to be breaking ground by late summer.

Paperwork and plans are being finalized for the Northome Bridge Project also, which we also hope to begin work on by late Fall.

There will be some changes at the Carson's ramp this summer. The parking lot across the street from the ramp will be paved and striped in coordination with our other street projects this year. And, a solar powered boat cleaning station is being loaned to us by Hennepin County for use at the ramp. It does not power wash, but rather vacuums debris from your boat and trailer. Our concern will be that we do not cause further congestion at the ramp while folks are trying out the new equipment, but please let us know if you like it.
