#### **Christmas Tree Disposal**

Waste Management will collect all real trees on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday during the weeks of January 4, 2021 and January 11, 2021.

Please contact Waste Management at 952-890-1100 to schedule your pickup.

There is **no charge** for this pickup and the trees collected as part of this program will be chipped and used for compost. Please note that wreaths and flocked or artificial trees cannot be composted. These items should be set out with your regular garbage.

To ensure your tree is collected and composted, please:

- Remove all decorations and wire;
- Do NOT wrap the tree in a plastic bag; and
- Place the tree at the end of your driveway by 7:00 a.m. the day of your scheduled pickup. Trees set out too early may get buried from passing snowplows, making it very difficult to free the tree from the snow.



## **Warming House Closed**

While the ice rinks and restrooms at Village Hall Park and Thorpe Park will continue to be open for public use, the warming houses at both parks **will not be open** due to the surge in COVID-19 cases and Governor Walz latest guidelines regarding the use of public facilities.

We are hoping that once conditions change, we will be able to open the warming houses to the public. The opening of the warming houses will likely coincide with the reopening of Deephaven City Hall to the public.

In the meantime, benches will be provided to allow people to change into their skates and the outdoor lights will be on from 4:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.



# Board of Review Meeting scheduled for Monday, April 19, at 6:00 p.m.

When you review your property tax statements this March, please note that your property tax is determined by four factors: the amount of money spent by each local taxing jurisdiction, the impact of the market value exclusion credit, the taxable market value of your property, and your property classification.

The Deephaven Board of Review will address objections to the *market value or property classification* of your property on Monday, April 19<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m. The Board's powers are limited to these two areas.

<u>Steps to Appeal Your Property Value:</u> What should you do if you believe the estimated market value of your property is higher than other comparable properties?

**Step 1** – Meet with City Assessor Dan Distel. If you have reason to believe that the estimated market value of your property is higher than other comparable properties, we strongly recommend that your very first step should be to contact City Assessor Dan Distel at his Home Office 952-361-0566 to discuss this issue in greater detail. He may be able to answer your questions without having to attend the Board of Review meeting.

**Step 2** - If, after discussing this information with the assessor, you still feel you have good comparable sales and information to support an appeal, you should attend the Board of Review meeting on April 19<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m. at Deephaven City Hall. Please remember that the property owner is responsible for presenting evidence to the Board as to why the market value as determined by the assessor is not fair and equitable.

# Appeals at the April 19<sup>th</sup> Board of Review will be considered in the following order:

- Those residents who have met with the Assessor but were unable to come to a mutual agreement on the estimated market value of your property.
- 2. Those residents presenting their cases in advance of the meeting by letter or email.
- And lastly, those residents who have come directly to the board without advance notice or without contacting the assessor prior to the meeting.
- Residents will be allowed five minutes to present their appeal to the Board.
- Residents will be notified within three business days of the board's decision.
- The board may decide to hold a reconvened meeting for the purpose of considering the appeals presented on April 19<sup>th</sup>. New appeals will not be heard at the reconvened meeting.



# **Northome Bridge Project Update**

This past September, the City was notified that it had been awarded \$400,000 in federal funding for the Northome Bridge as a result of a grant application submitted back in 2017. One of the conditions of this grant is that the City has to provide up to 20% or \$80,000 of the total grant.

More exciting news followed in October when the City Council learned that the State Legislature passed a Bonding Bill that included \$750,000 in funding for the Northome Bridge. This funding must be used exclusively for those costs associated with the construction of the Northome Bridge. The City is grateful to the efforts of Senator David Osmek and Representative Kelly Morrison for their invaluable efforts in obtaining this funding.

With this combined funding of \$1,150,000, the City Council has authorized preliminary engineering and design work to begin on the bridge. The preliminary cost estimates for the Northome Bridge are \$786,000 for a concrete beam option and \$966,000 for a steel beam option. Other design options are also under consideration and all designs will be provided on the City Webpage. Construction on a new bridge is unlikely to occur any earlier than Fall of 2021.


# **City Property Taxes Fund Many Services**

The owner of a \$650,000 median valued home in Deephaven will pay a total of \$8,010 in property taxes in 2021. Here's where your tax money ends up.

\$1,171 goes to the City of Deephaven – The City receives 14.6% of your property tax payment. A household with a median valued home of \$650,000 pays \$98 per month to the City for the following array of services:

- 24-hour police and fire protection
- Prompt snowplowing of all city streets
- Full-service parks with 8 tennis courts, 3 ball fields, 4 ice rinks & 7 playground structures
- Six beaches 3 with lifeguard services
- Three public trails
- Street maintenance, boulevard maintenance, street sweeping & street lighting
- Park maintenance
- Public tree maintenance
- Deer management
- Building & zoning code enforcement
- Office staff to assist residents and answer questions
- Municipal, State & National Elections

\$3,550 goes to the Minnetonka School District – The School District receives 44.3% of your property tax payment for public education through the property tax levy and a voter approved school levy. A household with a median valued home of \$650,000 pays about \$296 per month to the School District.



\$671 goes to other agencies such as the Watershed District, Metropolitan Council, Mosquito Control, Hennepin County Parks, Met Transit Debt, the Park Museum, Hennepin County HRA, and the Railroad Authority – These agencies receive about 8.4% of your property tax payment. A household with a median valued home of \$650,000 pays about \$56 per month to these various agencies.

In comparison with the other 44 cities in Hennepin County, Deephaven would rank with the 5<sup>th</sup> lowest tax capacity rate in 2021.

# **2021 Improvement Projects**

Major 2021 projects will include street resurfacing on Carson Road, West Easton Road, Eastwood Drive, Hamilton Avenue, and Maplewood Road. The cost of resurfacing these streets is estimated at approximately \$540,000. More information on this project will be forthcoming in future newsletters and on the City's website at

# **Rental Property & Utility and Garbage Payments**

If you are currently renting your home, please be aware that the Deephaven City Code requires all delinquent water, sewer and garbage/recycling bills to be assessed to the property owner. It can come as an unpleasant surprise to a property owner to learn that an assessment will be placed against their property because their renter hasn't been paying their quarterly utility bills or garbage/recycling bills.

If you are renting your home, we strongly recommend that you consider the fact that the property owner is ultimately responsible for payment of utility and garbage bills.





# **Snowplow Damage**



Please note, however, that the City will only repair those mailboxes or posts that were <u>actually hit by the plow</u>. It is not uncommon for posts to be damaged by snow or ice from the plow and it is the responsibility of the homeowner to ensure that their mailbox post is strong enough to withstand being hit periodically by snow and ice.



City personnel do not clear private driveways nor do we intentionally plow more snow into your driveway than your neighbor. You may inadvertently receive more snow due to the angle of the plow blade or the angle of the street.



Along with snowplows come snowmobiles and ATV's. If you are operating a snowmobile or ATV within the city limits, please be aware that Ordinance No. 705.03 <u>prohibits</u> the operation of snow mobiles and ATV's under any of the following circumstances:

- On a sidewalk or walkway used for pedestrian traffic,
- On private property without having in possession written consent from the property owner,
- On any public land or frozen waters including, but not limited to, school property, park property, public beaches, playgrounds and recreational areas except for areas authorized for such use (the Carson's Bay and St. Louis Bay boat launches, for example) when traveling to or from the approved snowmobile routes.
- Between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:30 a.m., except for travel to or from a final destination without delay, and
- On any street except when traveling to or from an approved area by the shortest legal route. We thank you for your assistance in this matter.

#### 2021 Storm Water Rate Increase

On December 7, 2020, the Deephaven City Council approved a \$5.00 per month storm water rate increase that will go into effect in January 2021 with payments due beginning with the April 2021 utility billing. The storm water rate will increase from \$8.50 per month to \$13.50 per month. This rate increase will generate an additional \$88,920 per year in Storm Water Fund revenues. This is the second storm water rate increase in two years.

Why is a rate increase needed? The Storm Water Fund finances the repair and replacement of all existing catch basins, culverts, and storm water mains throughout Deephaven. It also funds all future additions to the storm water system, which have been estimated at \$803,000 over the next ten years. Every time the City resurfaces a street, it is not uncommon to have to replace deteriorating storm water lines, catch basins and culverts located under the street. This rate increase will finance these projects and other storm water improvements, as well as provide necessary funding to help address issues pertaining to landlocked ponds and wetlands.

#### **Interested in Frisbee Golf?**

The Deephaven Park Committee is evaluating whether to add a frisbee golf course at Thorpe Park. The course would consist of 3 holes and would be located away from walking paths and playground equipment. The installation of the course would be done using donated labor and would not result in the removal of any trees or alter the terrain.
