21st Annual Hackensack Chainsaw Event

The 21st Annual Hackensack Chainsaw Event, September 26–28, was a huge success, drawing over 2,200 attendees throughout the weekend. We welcomed 12 talented carvers from across the U.S., including two from Texas. While many are returning participants, we're always excited to introduce a few new faces each year. This year's two carving auctions raised over \$100,000—a record-breaking total! Proceeds are shared with the carvers, and the remaining funds benefit the City of Hackensack, Hackensack Lions Club, Hackensack American Legion Post 202, and the Hackensack Chamber of Commerce.

The highest-selling carving was created by Chad Danczyk and auctioned for \$4,250. His stunning work featured an eagle, fox, bear, owl, raccoon, and wolf—a beautiful tribute to the Northwoods and a clear favorite with the crowd. The always-popular All American Lumberjack Show brought high energy to the weekend with events like Log Boom Racing, Log Rolling, and X-Cut Sawing, complete with enthusiastic audience



On Friday, we hosted local **5th and 6th grade students for a special educational day,** offering a behind-thescenes look at the art and skill of chainsaw carving.

This event could not happen without the **dedication of our many volunteers**, **sponsors**, **carvers and guests-and we extend our heartfelt thanks** to each and every one of them. We also deeply appreciate the support of the **local resorts who generously host our carvers** throughout the weekend. We can't wait to see you again in 2026 which will be **September 25-27!**

Something magical is brewing in Hackensack. As the Highway 371 construction nears completion, the Hackensack Game Changers 'Snowflake & Banners **Team**' invites you to help transform the new corridor into a winter wonderland.

We're on a mission to "make it snow" with 48 glowing, LED-lit, 4-foot snowflakes and vibrant seasonal banners adorning the new lampposts. This isn't just decoration - it's a celebration of community pride, unity, and small-town charm.

The snowflakes, available in four styles, each costs just under \$500, is made in the USA, and comes with a 6-year warranty. Banners are under \$70 and available in two winter designs. You can donate as an individual, family, business, book club, church, lake association—or simply as a group of friends who love Hackensack. Every contribution helps us light up 371 and show the world the energy and love that live here.

This volunteer-driven effort is led by the Hackensack Game Changers, a 501(c) (3) nonprofit dedicated to beautifying and rejuvenating our town. We've endured the dust and disruption of construction-now let's celebrate with a corridor of light and magic that uplifts everyone who passes through.

Hackensack Housing Upgrade Grant Program By Kris Biessener

Exciting news for local homeowners! The Hackensack Local Housing Trust Fund (HLHTF) has received a grant from MN Housing to launch a new initiative to help yearround residents improve their homes.



This program will be implemented the by Resilient Housing Team (of the Game Changers). Eligible homeowners can apply for grants to make upgrades, repairs, modifications that support safe living conditions or reduce energy costs.

Each participating home will receive an energy audit or home inspection to identify areas needing improvement. The **Resilient Housing Team** will review, and homeowners with approved projects will then get quotes and select licensed local contractors to carry out the work, ensuring community dollars stay local.

Common upgrades include insulation and weather stripping, furnace, water heater, or gas appliance repair/ replacement, and window and door updates.

To qualify, applicants must be the owner and occupant of the home, have current homeowner's insurance, provide income documentation (must not exceed 115% of the State Median Income), be current on mortgage payments (if applicable), be current on property taxes, and agree to obtain quotes from licensed local contractors.

All grant funds will be distributed directly from the HLHTF to the selected vendors and subcontractors.

A public meeting will be held soon to introduce the program, answer questions, and distribute applications to interested residents. Stay tuned for the date and location!



Countryside Co-op, Then & Now By Kathy Betersen

Hackensack's Countryside Co-op, a buyer's club, founded in 1975, remains completely volunteer operated. Over time, the number of volunteers has been declining. More recently, board member volunteers have dwindled to 5 active directors, making the overall management of the store unsustainable. A full board consists of 9 directors. A community and membership search was initiated this past summer, with an overwhelmingly positive response.

A food buyer's club is a group of individuals who pool their purchasing power to buy food items in bulk directly from producers or wholesalers, achieving lower prices and potentially reducing packaging and shipping. Our co-op provides healthy food choices to our members, donates its products for events sponsored by local organizations, and passes its profits onto 5 area food shelves. Its presence has become an invaluable asset to the community.

Over the summer, an **S.O.S.** (Save our Store) message, seeking board volunteers, was handed out to all members, as they visited the store. Newspaper articles

NORTHWOODS ARTS COUNCIL Bringing the Arts to Life were placed in 3 local newspapers. There were approximately 40 inquiries, for both board members and regular volunteers. The board candidates were contacted by phone and vetted. Viable candidates were then invited to start training at the work stations and lead position. Three board positions were elected at our annual meeting in August, and 2 board members were appointed at our September board meeting. 10 new regular volunteers have been trained and are now working.

a dynamic new initiative was launched: the Lane Changers team. Spearheaded by Game Changers, this group brought together representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, the HLACF, local business leaders, and several Game Changers board members. We were honored to welcome DeeDee LeMier, a MN Extension educator, whose insights added tremendous value to the effort.

Thanks to a **Boost Grant from Sourcewell**, the team kicked off a series of brainstorming sessions that led to the creation of "Construction Lucette," a cheerful ambassador designed by Lindsay Lorenz to bring visibility and positivity to the project.

Recognizing that clear communication would be key, the team prioritized outreach. A weekly email update was launched in May and has since reached over 450 subscribers-including residents, tourists, and weekend visitorsgarnering 100% positive feedback. These updates provide timely information on construction progress, detours, and business access, helping everyone navigate

the changing landscape with ease. To further support local businesses, temporary signage was installed to guide customers to storefronts as access routes shifted. Additional grants from the Initiative Foundation are helping businesses refresh their curb appeal, with support for landscape design and parking lot striping for those affected by the reconstruction. Business owners along the 371 construction corridor can take advantage of a grant received through the Initiative Foundation. The Hackensack Game Changers applied to the Foundation for assistance in two areas for our businesses and churches:

1) Parking Areas: We can assist with striping of your parking lot. Hackensack Lumber & Hardware has offered to sell paint for striping at their cost. Rob Triplett will do the striping and will be paid through the grant.

2) Landscape & Design: Used for your business frontage. Arrangements are also being made to allow you to purchase shrubs and plantings at a discount.
