


fees/sewer rates rather than taxes. The estimated funding needed to repay these loans and operate the system would require a sewer rate for residential users of \$74-75 per month.



The council approved a plan to implement the increase in two steps during the budget process with the first rate increase being adopted in October to \$60 per month for residential customers and the next

increase in approximately 1 year. The resolution to adopt this increase and a \$10 service charge for "door hanger" delivery will be on the October council agenda.

Four residents have filed for the openings on the city council. Current mayor Jeanne

Hampton was the only candidate to file for the mayor position.

The candidates for the council are Tammie Williams, Janie Enright, Dick Yoder and Chad Ray. Janie Enright is an incumbent and Tammie Williams is on the council currently as she was appointed to fill a council vacancy.

Karl Jensen and Gayle Yoder did not refile. Jerry Gaunt and Robert Harris will remain on the council with terms expiring at the end of Dec. 2020.

All Echo City Council seats are at large so the four candidates with the most votes among those on the ballot and any potential write-ins will become council members.

Despite the accusations made last fall, the City of Echo and Echo City Council and Staff do not and legally cannot run background checks on candidates.

Work on the T'Ko hiking path will also start this fall: marking, benches, exercise station.



Water Conservation Tips

#1 When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Fill one sink with wash water and the other with rinse water.

#2 Adjust sprinklers so only your lawn is watered and not the house, sidewalk, or street.

#3 Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.

#4 Choose shrubs and groundcovers instead of turf for hard-to-water areas such as steep slopes and isolated strips.



#5 Install covers on pools and spas and check for leaks around your pumps.

#6 Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time. Using Garbage Disposals by dumping grease and milk products also puts a burden on the city sewer system and can plug your pipes.

#7 Plant in the fall when conditions are cooler and rainfall is more plentiful.

#8 For cold drinks keep a pitcher of water in the refrigerator instead of running the tap. This way, every drop goes down you and not the drain.

#9 Monitor your water bill for unusually high use. Your bill and water meter are tools that can help you discover leaks.

#10 Water your lawn and garden in the morning or evening when temperatures are cooler to minimize evaporation.

#11 Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.

#12 Use a broom instead of a hose to clean your driveway and sidewalk and save water every time.

#13 If your shower fills a one-gallon bucket in less than 20 seconds, replace the showerhead with a water-efficient model.

#14 Collect the water you use for rinsing fruits and vegetables, then reuse it to water houseplants.

#15 If water runs off your lawn easily, split your watering time into shorter periods to allow for better absorption.

#16 We're more likely to notice leaks indoors, but don't forget to check outdoor faucets, sprinklers and hoses for leaks.

#17 Check the root zone of your lawn or garden for moisture before watering using a spade or trowel. If it's still moist two inches under the soil surface, you still have enough water.

#18 When buying new appliances, consider those that offer cycle and load size adjustments. They're more water and energy efficient.

#19 Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll save up to 150 gallons per month.

#20 Adjust your lawn mower to a higher setting. A taller lawn shades roots and holds soil moisture better than if it is closely clipped.
