
Most Thursday, Friday and Saturday's throughout the summer months, the Face of Fillmore near the Territorial Statehouse is changed with dozens of tents dotting the shaded park. Building Zion Youth Camp has become a popular youth camp destination for wards throughout the state of Utah, as well as for family reunions.

In many areas there are pioneer treks for the youth giving them the pioneers coming across the plains experience. Building Zion Youth Camp takes this a step farther.
