Recent Fire Recalls History 1943 Of Lyndon Baptist Church

april 2

When fire on the afternoon of April 3 completely destroyed the Lyndon Baptist church, which was located on Highway 57, two miles south of Waldo, it removed a historic landmark. The fire started when flames from burning grass on the adjoining property were carried by the high wind to the church. Before the men who were burning the grass could control it, the church was almost entirely destroyed. It took only 20 minutes for the complete destruction. Although the Waldo fire department responded, the firefighters were helpless.

The last pastor was the Rev. Mr. Breen who served there from 1913 through 1915. After his departure no regular services were held there. It was last used in 1921 for the funeral of Joe Oosterhuis.

One of the members of the former congregation prepared a history of the church by perusing old records. The facts she assembled are published because of the link the church had with the county's early history.

On the 10th day of October in 1851 several people met at Cascade and moved to form a church. That same year on Nov. 22 a public meeting was called to recognize this group as a church. In attendance were representatives from Ozaukee county, Sheboygan, Town Scott, Greenbush and Sheboygan Falls churches.

After reading the Scriptures and discussions, it was resolved that they be recognized as the "Regular Baptist church" with Elder Works preaching, T. L. Irwin, moderator, and Herman Hazelton, clerk.

The original members were Steffen Warren and wife, Edmund Bixby and wife, and Joel Raddick and wife. On Dec. 27, 1851, a motion was made to call the Rev. T. L. Irwin as the pastor with a yearly salary of \$50. At this time services were held in a schoolhouse near Cascade, but on March 2, 1863, the members met to discuss building a church. On Dec.

31, 1863, the church was dedicated, and Elder Lull was the pastor. Members voted on May 13, 1865, to change the name to the Lyndon Baptist church, and it was known as that for 78 years.

The church thrived for many years and had a large and active membership. It was an important place in the community. In 1930 the membership became so small, only five members remaining, that the church was sold to the Lyndon Cemetery association.

Along with the years have come many changes, and while only a few members remain who are interested in the church, they greatly regret the fire that destroyed it. To these people the fellowship and association of the past still remain a tender memory.

Funeral services were held in the unfinished Lyndon Baptist Church for Captain Abner Heald, the first soldier from this area to lay down his life for his country in the Civil War. He was killed in action in the battle of Chicamauga in Sept. 1863.

Lyndon Baptist Church Destroyed By Fire



The Lyndon Baptist church, which was located on Highway 57, two miles south of Waldo, was completely destroyed by fire Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Men were burning grass in the adjoining property and cemetery when the high wind took the fire through the grass and up to the church. Before the men could control the grass fire, the church was well under way to being destroyed. The Waldo fire department responded

but was helpless to save the church. Thurman Reinke of Waldo, who was at the scene of the fire, stated that the complete destruction of the church took only 20 minutes.

The Lyndon Baptist church was last used in 1921 for a funeral service of Mr. Oosterhuis. Since that time the church was only kept as a landmark by the members of the congregation.

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About 1900 John Buelke bought a small building and had it fitted up for church purposes.

The Certificate of Organization was dated February 27, 1905 at Waldo, WI. It was notarized by Henry W. Timmer March 1, 1905 and recorded March 2, 1905 at 9:30 a.m. in Volume B of Religious Societies, Pages 201/202.

The Rev. C.D. Mayhew of Sheboygan Falls, conducted services for the Waldo Congregation.

The Waldo Baptist Church became reality on February 14, 1910 with a parcel of land purchased of from John and Louise C. Buelke. This property was located on the southeast corner of Harmon and 1st Street in the Village of Waldo. The building used as the house of worship was originally a warehouse erected during the early 1890's by Wedemeyer and Lawson.

The charter members of this new church were John Buelke, Paul Buelke, W.J. Joslin, Ida B. McIntyre, Eliza Townsend, Lizzie Robinson, Emma Ebelt, Benjamin Halter, Phoebe Halter, Ella Halter, Jay Halter, Esther Wierman, Gertrude Oosterhous, John D. Curtiss, Belle Holbrook, Mary Holbrook, Mrs. Lizzie Curtiss, Mrs. Adelia Hadley, and Hannah E. Brookshire. Associate Members were Rola McIntyre and Harmon McIntyre.

It was decided at a regular meeting of the Church on October 9, 1936, that the

property would be transferred to the Wisconsin State Baptist Convention and the Church would be disbanded. Some of the members united with the First Baptist Church of Sheboygan Falls, while the remaining members joined the Waldo Methodist Church.

On December 10, 1937 the property was sold to Caroline E. Harling with an interesting proviso: *"the undersigned hereby covenants and agrees that she will not use or permit said premises to be used for the sale or for the purpose of dealing or trafficking in intoxicating liquors, of any kind, or any wines or vinous or spirituous or malt liquors, as long as she remains the owner of said property, and that she will likewise not sell or convey or let said premises, or any part of them, to any person or persons, firm or corporation, who intends or is likely to use said premises for said purposes, or whom the undersigned has reason to believe may use said premises for said purposes. The undersigned further agrees that in the event of breach of the foregoing covenant, the said premises shall revert to the grantor."*

The Church building was used by Arno Meyer for a period of time in and around 1941 as an outlet for selling apples grown in his orchards.

Some Waldo residents believe the Church building burned later and some believe it was torn down for the wood. But Harry and Norma Chisolm tell me that Leo Lisowe bought the building from Arno Meyer, after Arno no longer needed it, and moved it to Highway 57 and at the intersection of Highway 28. It was then converted to the tavern that eventually became known as Chissy's Pub. Nevertheless, the foregoing covenant stipulated by the church was never breached.

Ebenezer and Elenor/Eleanor (Weymouth) Ames came from Maine with their 9 children to live on an 80-acre farm in the southeast corner of Town Lyndon. We don't know if they were aware that their ancestors who came to America were part of the terrible tragedies surrounding the witch hunts around Salem. John Ames' wife Rebecca was tried and convicted in Massachusetts in 1692 for witchcraft. Her life was spared when the hysteria died out. Ebenezer & Elenor and their daughter Mary E died at age 21 in 1864 and they are all buried at Lyndon Cem. There is a discrepancy in Elenor's year of death. The gravestone says 1865 but it could also be 1863.

Ebenezer Ames Family

Ebenezer Ames was born on Sept 30, 1894 in Maine, the son of Ezra Ames (Eames) and Lucy Garselon. His ancestors include Rebecca, wife of John Ames, who was tried and convicted of witchcraft in Salem in 1692. Her life was spared when the killing hysteria died down.

Again we are called upon to chronicle the death of one of our friends and old and highly respected citizens, whom, owing to her quiet and loving disposition, kind and thoughtful words, we all have learned to love and honor. One and all who knew her as Grandma Baldwin will have recollections of her as a true, kind-hearted friend, and although we shall miss her, we cannot mourn for her as in many other cases, she having fully expressed her readiness and desire to pass on to the other shore where she hoped to find an eternal happy home and to meet all her dear ones and friends, never again to bid them farewell.

"Grandma" Baldwin departed this life peacefully and without a struggle on Tuesday evening, Jan. 21, 1908 at 7:00 o'clock, at the ripe old age of 89 years, 4 months and 1 day.

Susan Day Hubbard was born Sept. 20, 1828 at Burlington, N. Y., in which state her early life was spent. In 1836 she was united in marriage to Eliarda Baldwin. In 1847 they came west, leaving their old home, relatives and friends, to make for themselves a new home in a new country. They brought with them two daughters, leaving one daughter in New York in the care of her grandmother. A tract of land upon which not a tree had been felled was purchased in the town of Sherman near the present village of Batavia. Here a son and daughter were born to them. During her life in this new country she won many friends by her amiable and cheerful disposition and kindly thoughtfulness for the welfare and happiness of others. Many of these friendships formed in her early pioneer days were sources of great comfort to her in her declining years. In the year 1869 they sold the old farm in Sherman and moved to the farm of his son Levi H. Baldwin in this village. The many kindnesses of neighbors and friends extended to her during her years of infirmity, are significant of the esteem in which they held her. Her gentle forbearance and simple faith were emblematic of the sweetness and strength of her character which has been shown through her afflictions in the loss of her sight which entirely left her about five years ago, due to cataracts growing over her eyes. Her mind was stored with beautiful thoughts and during her latter days she formed into verse some of these thoughts and we publish same herewith as she gave them to us.

"My Father's house is built on high,
And all his children will soon draw nigh.
From north to south, from east to west,
He calls his children home to rest.

There is a day of peaceful rest,
To weary travelers given;
There is a balm for soul's distressed,
That's only found in Heaven.
There is a God that rules the sky,
That bears his children when they cry;
And when he comes to call them home,
Into a world of joys unknown.
And when our days are o'er,
And we are here no more;
Then shall we tread the Golden shore
Singing praises ever more.
When we all get home in the morning,
What a meeting that will be;
The saints all gathered together,

Two children have passed away, Mrs. Mary Robinson about five years ago and Clarissa died nearly forty years ago at the age of 13 years. The funeral services were held at the home Friday, at 11 o'clock. Rev. E. E. Dresser of Sheboygan officiated and undertaker John Zuengler of Adell had charge. Interment was made in the Lyndon Baptist cemetery west of the village. The pall bearers were Amos L. Tibbitts, Russell Hyatt, Christian Flaig, James Huyck, W. W. Potter and George Pollard.

W. A. Barber, Widely Known And Prominent Resident Of Waldo, Is Called To Rest

Waldo.—Whitman Ashby Barber, manager of the Waldo Canning Co. for twenty-three years, president of the Waldo State bank for ten years and prominent throughout Sheboygan county for many years of service in various public offices, died at his home here at 4:30 a. m. Sunday after a lingering illness. The deceased was 75 years of age.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home here at 2 p. m. Wednesday. The Rev. C. D. Mayhew of Sheboygan Falls will officiate, and interment will be made in the Lyndon cemetery.

W. A. Barber was born on a farm one and one-half miles southeast of Waldo October 17, 1854. He was the son of Wentworth Barber and Elizabeth Ashby Barber, his mother being a sister of William Ashby, pioneer Sheboygan township resident, a resident of the county as early as 1836 and a member of the family after which the old bridge on the Lower Falls road was named.

Mr. Barber attended the district school near his home until the age of 17 years, when he attended Ripon College for one year. He returned to this community and for two years served as a school teacher in Silver Creek. He was united in marriage with Miss Lina Wendell, Silver Creek, in 1875. She preceded him in death three years later. In September 1886, he was united in marriage with Miss Cora Sprague of Carmel, N. Y., who survives him.

Few men of this county were more widely popular or more generally prominent in business and social circles of the entire county than the deceased. He enjoyed a host of friends and acquaintances who will join the relatives in mourning his passing. He was endowed with a sterling character and a faithfulness which characterized his business efforts throughout life. Highly respected and dearly beloved, the passing of Mr. Barber is recognized as a blow to this community.

Mr. Barber's prominence was not confined to this county. He was elected to the state assembly for two terms, from 1896 to 1900. He served as town chairman from 1888 to 1900 and was assessor for his township for a number of years. He

also served as justice of peace for a few years and held other town and municipal offices.

Mr. Barber served as a trustee of the Sheboygan Insane Asylum for seven years. He was associated with the Twin Buttes Mining and Smelting company for twenty-seven years, during seventeen years of which time he served in the capacity of president. He also served as manager and vice president of the Waldo Canning company over a long period of years.

The deceased was a man who took a lively interest in community affairs and was a charter member of the Waldo I. D. O. F. lodge.

Before becoming a public figure in this county, he operated his father's farm near here from 1875 to 1907. He moved to Waldo in 1907 and became business manager of the Waldo Canning company, resigning the position because of ill health two years ago but continuing to serve as president of the Waldo State bank until the time of his death.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. H. C. Hubbard of Tucson, Arizona.



Wentworth W Barber who in later life lived on Section 23, Town Lyndon, was the son of Caleb (d1847) and Polly (d1864) (Crampton) Barber and was born in Town Berkshire, Franklin County, Vermont on 12/28/1819. The family moved to Wisconsin in 1841 and Wentworth dates his arrival in Sheboygan from December 8, 1841. Wentworth worked for William Ashby, oldest living settler of Sheboygan Co. at his sawmill. He also worked for the old Indian trader, William Farnsworth.

In 1845 he acquired 80 acres from the government in Town Lyndon, the first land entered in this community. He married Mary Elizabeth Ashby on Sept 6, 1847. Their 3 children were (1.) Whitman Ashby Barber who married Nina Windel/Wendell (aka Lina on cemetery records), (2.) Julia Barber, b. 10/17/1853 - d. 2/20/1903, and (3) Hattie Barber, b. 8/1/1858 - d. 1/14/1859. Mary Eliz. died 9/6/1866 and in April, 1867 Wentworth married (2) Mrs Angeline (Colwell) Conner of Putnam Co, NY.

Wentworth's son, Whitman Ashby Barber and his first wife Nina/Lina Windel had one daughter, Mamie. Nina died May 22, 1879 and Whitman A then married Cora Sprague, a New York native, shortly after Nina's death. (They had a daughter, Julia Barber, born after 1880, and named, probably, for her Aunt Julia, ???).

THE OLDEST SETTLER

Was Called to His Reward
 This Morning.

THE DEATH OF WENTWORTH BARBER

The Dead Man Was the Oldest White
 Settler in Sheboygan County--In
 His 81st Year.

Wentworth Barber, a well known and successful farmer of the town of Lyndon died at 8:30 this morning, aged nearly 81 years.

The decedent had been a sufferer from asthma for some time, and this, coupled with the ravages of the advancing years, was the cause of his death. For the past six weeks he had been in very feeble health and latterly his death was not unexpected.

The decedent leaves one son--Chairman W. A. Barber of Lyndon, who also is a member of the assembly--and one daughter, Julia, at home. His second wife died some four years ago.

OLDEST WHITE RESIDENT.

Wentworth Barber was the oldest white resident of Sheboygan county at the time of his death, his residence dating from Dec. 8, 1841. He was born in the town of Berkshire, Franklin county, Vt., Dec. 28, 1819. His parental grandfather was one of the heroes of the Revolutionary war.

On coming west he hired out to William Ashby, who afterward became a brother-in-law, and worked in a sawmill at \$18 a month. Previous to his death, William Ashby was the oldest settler in the county, having come here in 1836.

On arriving here Mr. Barber had only twenty shillings. His entire possessions, which were considerable, were acquired by his industry and thrift. He was essentially a self-made man.

Mr. Barber at one time worked for the old Indian trader, William Farnsworth. Once the Indians pitched their tent on the site of which he had charge. They were told by Mr. Barber to leave, and when they did not do so he threw them into the river.

In 1845 he entered 80 acres of land in Lyndon township--the first entered in this community--and in 1847 began the development of the wild prairie. The entire county was then on the border of civilization.

NOT AN OFFICE SEEKER.

Mr. Barber never had a desire to hold office. In early life he was an old-line Whig and was an enthusiastic supporter of William Henry Harrison, although not quite old enough to vote at the time. After the organization of the Republican party he became a staunch advocate of its principles.

He always took an active interest in the cause of education and aided in building the first schoolhouse in Lyndon township. He was always identified with the progress and prosperity of the community. He was instrumental in the establishment of the Baptist church and his name is inseparably connected with every public improvement in his locality.


He was the owner of 320 acres of rich land, pleasantly located within a mile and a half of Waldo. This is a valuable estate, and the beautiful country residence, in the midst of well-kept grounds and good outbuildings, stands a monument to his thrift and enterprise. He had the respect and esteem of all who knew him.





Gotthart Buchen, born 1846, married Elizabeth Heinke. They are buried at Lyndon Cemetery with Gotthart's brother Gustave who died in 1881 at age 22; also with Gotthart's sons Gustave William and Arthur J. Judge Gustave W Buchen wrote an excellent history of Sheboygan County. During the Civil War, Gotthart Buchen served with Company E of the 27th Wisconsin Infantry Regiment.

Gustave W Buchen who gathered the accurate historical information of Sheboygan County and turned it into an excellent textbook included this brief biography of his parents.

"Gotthardt Buchen was born in Saxon Altenburg, Germany, Dec 6, 1846, and after coming to the United States, in 1854, settled with his parents on a small farm in the Town of Wilson in Sheboygan County. On August 21, 1862, when he was only fifteen years of age, he enlisted as a drummer boy in Co. E, 27th Reg. Wis. Vol. Inf. He served in the army three years, and was discharged from service at Brownsville, Texas, Aug. 29, 1865. On Nov. 17, 1867, he was married to Elizabeth Heinke, who was born in Mecklenburg, Germany, Mar. 24, 1847, and located with her parents on a farm in the town of Sheboygan Falls. In 1872 Gotthardt and Elizabeth Buchen bought a large farm in the town of Lyndon, where they continued to live until their deaths. He died Jan. 10, 1894, and she died Feb 2, 1897. A successful farmer, Gotthardt Buchen was also an active live stock dealer, commercial thresherman, and cheese factory owner. At the time of his death he was Commander of Abner O Heald Post No 192 of the G.A.R., at Cascade."

G Buchen, a highly respected citizen and pioneer of this county was stricken with paralysis on Monday, at his home two miles south of Cascade. He had been enjoying his usual health and went to the woods for a load; on returning to his home before noon he complained to his wife of a severe pain in his head and he lay down on the lounge to rise no more. His condition became more alarming when a physician was called and found him past recovery.

Tuesday night, Jan. 9th, at 12 o'clock his spirit took its flight to the happy place over the river to return no more, age 47 years. Deceased was a kind and loving husband, affectionate father, a good neighbor and a most valuable member of society. He was always ready with willing hands and opened pocket book to do all kind acts that came in sight for him to do. He left his father's home when everything was most dear to him to serve his country's defence during the rebellion and earned a reputation for valor on the field of battle. Those shining stars that he did so well to protect on the battle field are unfurled to the breezes now in Cascade in honor of one to whom honor is due. A boy on the farm, Mr. Buchen attended Joint School District Number Two of the Townships of Lyndon and Sherman, and later, the graded school at Waldo, walking four miles to school in all kinds of weather. At the age of 12, after the death of his parents, he went to live with an older brother who had become sheriff, and that was the turning point of his life. As a boy in the Sheboygan High School, and mingling with the participants at trials in the court house, he conceived the ambition to become a lawyer. Graduating from the High School in 1905 he entered the State University at Madison, where he became interested in the study of American history, and more especially, the history of the West, under that great historian of the American frontier, Professor Frederick Jackson Turner.

Mr. Buchen graduated from the University in 1909, and for some time taught school in order that he might continue his education in the law. For two years he was a teacher of public speaking in the University of Oregon on the Pacific coast. Later he returned to the University of Wisconsin as an instructor of public speaking, and he was admitted to the bar of Wisconsin in June, 1912.

Since that time Mr. Buchen has been actively engaged in the practice of law in Sheboygan, and at the present time holds the position of State Senator from the twentieth senatorial district. A student and a lawyer, bent upon thoroughness at all times, it was but a step for him to enter upon his literary venture. He knew where to gain the information, and he sought out avenues and traced them religiously in his efforts to compile a history that would be historically correct. This work has taxed his efforts for ten long years, browsing among untouched fields of research. Many times have we been approached on some phase of this important work, and as President of the Sheboygan County Historical Society it gives me unbounded pleasure to recommend this book to the many lovers of history who have hesitated to undertake this task themselves because of the research and the cost incidental to preparing a book of this character.

We have always marveled at the detail in which the historically-minded people of Green Bay have preserved their records. Unfortunately many counties were less fortunate, and fires and other incidents of destruction have obscured early events. It took a man like Mr. Buchen to trace all this, and to bring it into one volume

State Senator Gustave W. Buchen, 65, prominent attorney, public speaker, former educator and an authority on Sheboygan County history, died at 9 p. m. Monday, at Memorial hospital here following a protracted illness.

Death came as he was serving his third consecutive term in the upper house of the Wisconsin Legislature. He suffered several heart attacks last summer and in September resigned as a member of the senate's judiciary and public welfare committees.

His condition had been serious for some time and was the concern of his many friends in the community, especially recently.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday, at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. T. Parry Jones officiating. The body will lie in state at the Robert H. Kroos Funeral home from 5 p. m. Wednesday, until 10 a. m. Thursday.

At that hour it will be removed to the church, where friends may call from 11 a. m. until 1:45 p. m., when the casket will be closed. Burial will be made in the family lot in Lyndon cemetery.

Born in County

Gustave W. Buchen was born on a farm in the town of Lyndon on Sept. 25, 1886, the son of the late Guthardt and Elizabeth Heinke Buchen. His parents both passed away when he was 10 years of age, and the youth attended schools in the town of Lyndon, Sherman and later the elementary school at Waldo.

When his brother, Henry, was elected sheriff of Sheboygan County in 1898, the youngster moved to Sheboygan, coming here on Jan. 1, 1899. He attended the Second Ward School and high school here. At the age of 14 he became dependent upon his own resources and worked his way through the local schools, spending all his spare time working in

creameries, farms, lumber yards, factories and stores.

He worked for a time at the old Mattoon Manufacturing Company, now the Northern Furniture, at the Lakeside Canning Company and the Garton Toy

Active Republican

His political affiliations were with the Republican party, and in 1936 he was named a delegate to the national Republican convention and also elected chairman of the Sheboygan County Republican Club.

Mr. Buchen was first elected state senator from the 20th senatorial district, representing Sheboygan and Ozaukee Counties, in 1940, and has successfully been re-elected to two terms since. During his tenure of office at Madison, he was noted as a fiery orator on any and all subjects, and even when ill health began to force a curtailment of some of his activities, Senator Buchen oftentimes led discussion on pertinent matters on the senate floor.

He was chairman of the judiciary committee and a member of the Public Welfare Committee. Senator Buchen was noted for his outstanding counsel on legislative and judicial matters and his opinion on many matters of senatorial concern was often sought by members of both political parties.

Wrote County History

An ardent local historian, Senator Buchen was one of the best-versed men in the history of Sheboygan and the surrounding area, and several years ago published a complete history of Sheboygan County. His history served as a reference for many items in the growth of this county, covering the agricultural, industrial, cultural and racial developments in the county.

Some years ago he also wrote a series of articles for The Sheboygan Press on scenic spots of this area, with illustrations by A. J. Baum.

On January 8, 1947, Senator Buchen was married to Irene Jennings of Madison. Between legislative sessions at Madison, the couple lived in Sheboygan.

Survivors are his wife, Irene; two sons, District Attorney John Buchen of Sheboygan, and Attorney Phillip Buchen of Grand Rapids, Mich.; one daughter, Mrs. Robert (Dorothy) Cunn-

Mrs. E. C. Butters Who Came to the County in 1847 Answers the Final Summons. 9-13-1911



HYATT:—Alanson X. Hyatt, died Monday afternoon, Nov. 9, 1903, at his home on the south side in this city, of heart trouble after an illness of about two weeks, aged seventy-one years. Mr. Hyatt had during his entire life been a deep thinker and a hard worker, and only last spring sold his farm in Lima and moved to this city with a view to taking life easier in the twilight of his declining years. He was born on his father's farm in Putnam county, N. Y., opposite West Point, Apr. 16, 1832 and there he lived until twenty-five years of age. He received his early education in the common schools and attended the Arcadian High school in Carmel, N. Y. He came to Wisconsin and Sheboygan county in 1857. He taught school for a time here as well as in New York state and otherwise his life was spent in farming and writing on agricultural and dairy topics at spare times. He was widely known by the sobriquet of "Turnip Hyatt," owing to his extensive cultivation of that succulent root and his advocacy of its value as a food for cattle contrary to the teachings of many other prominent dairy farmers. Alanson Hyatt was one of a family of fourteen children.



Portrait & Bios has Clarke W, born Dec. 28, 1872, a graduate of Waldo High School in 1889. He is still alive in 1912. In 1897 he married Etma Scheibe. Both biographies list him as son of Abraham N and Addie Huson Jackson. Clarke M is alive in Plymouth in the 1922 Directory. In 1903 he was an officer of Plymouth Chair Co. We believe, from the dates of the stone b. 1827, that this may be a brother of Abraham b. 1820. Still looking for answers!





Body Found In Hay Loft

The body of a 36-year-old farmer was found Sunday hanging from a beam in a hay loft on a farm near Waldo.

Authorities said Marvin (Chuck) Klein of R. 1, Waldo, took his own life, although members of his family said they knew of no motive. He had not been in ill health.

The body was found by Klein's father, Charles, at 2:15 p.m.

Dr. Reed M. Simpson, Sheboygan County coroner, attributed death to suicide by hanging.

Mr. Klein was born on the Town of Lyndon farm of his parents, Charles and the late Ilma Klein, Feb. 25, 1928. He attended the former Whittier School and was graduated from Waldo High School.



Thomas Klein Loses Life In Auto Accident

Former Sheboygan County

In Collision Of Cars Near
Milwaukee Airport

Thomas A. Klein, 40, of 3927 E. Layton avenue, Milwaukee, former Sheboygan county resident, was killed early Thursday morning in an automobile accident at the entrance to the Milwaukee County airport.

Police said the car driven by Klein caromed into the rear of an automobile driven by Wallace W. Buelow, 23, of 4485 Quincy avenue, at 3:15 a. m. Thursday at the airport entrance.

Buelow told deputies that the collision had sent him into such a state of shock that he could not apply the brakes until the car had continued two blocks further east. By the time he returned to the scene of the mishap, the smashed Klein car had been abandoned.

An airport guard who witnessed the accident notified the sheriff's office.

Klein had almost immediately got out of his car and staggered about a block north of the thoroughfare where he collapsed in a field near the airport, police reported.

An early morning search of the neighborhood by deputy sheriffs had completely missed him. The body was found 10 hours later when a passing motorist noticed it in the field and summoned authorities.

A check-up disclosed that the







He experienced religion when a boy of fifteen years, uniting with the Baptist church there, where he remained an earnest christian worker. He took a letter from that church when he came west about forty years ago, locating in the town of Lyndon, this county. There he placed his letter with the Lyndon Baptist church, where he remained a faithful member. He withdrew from that church about the time he moved to this village fourteen years ago. After that time he did not unite with any church, but remained strong in the faith until the end. On the day of his death he was heard to express himself that, all was well; there was no darkness there. At the age of 21 he was married to Salina Wixon, and unto them were born seven children, all of whom are living, except one. Mr. Mead's death occurred Oct. 11, 1887, since which time Mrs. Mead has made her home at Onion River. Had she lived until the 23rd day of next May she would have been 93 years old.

Mrs. Mead was one of the original Daughters of the Revolution. Her father, Peter Robinson, was a native of Dutchess county, New York, where he was born May 8, 1761. It was during his young manhood that the colonists severed their connection with the mother country. He took an active part in the long and weary struggle. Many of our readers can recall the interesting anecdotes incident to these times which Mrs. Mead has oft re-

its final reward in a sleep that was peaceful and sweet—a fitting end for one whose life was nearing the century mark and was only waiting for the Master's call.

A week ago she visited her son, C. R. Mead, in this city and enjoyed her usual good health. She returned home Friday and shortly after was taken ill, but was not confined to her bed only at intervals. Deceased is survived by one son, C. R. Mead, of this city, and one daughter, Mrs. C. Wright, of Delavan, and grandchildren residing in this city as follows: M. C. Mead and Mesdames C. D. Eastman and R. W. Robertson.

Beside being remarkable for her wonderful vitality and the powers she retained to such an advanced age, she was also noted as being one of the very few surviving original daughters of the Revolution. Born in Kent, Putnam county, N. Y., May 23, 1811, she was the youngest child of Peter Robinson, who, though but sixteen years of age when the Revolutionary war broke out, soon joined the Continental army. He was under Benedict Arnold at West Point just before that general committed treason and was one of the soldiers whom Arnold tried to starve, becoming so weak from lack of food that he was unable to walk. He was also with Washington at Valley Forge and endured everything except death during that fearful winter.

In securing a pension, the principal witness in Mr. Robinson's behalf was Enoch Crosby who went all through the part of New York in which Putnam county is situated as a spy. He was the original Harvey Burch in Cooper's "Spy."

Mrs. Mead's brother Nathaniel was a minister and preached over thirty years in one place in Putnam county. During his pastorate he married over five hundred couples and officiated at more than a thousand funerals. The house which he built over sixty years ago is still standing.

With her husband, Major Mead, to whom she was married while very young, she moved west, landing at Sheboygan, June 9, 1850. The same day they went to the town of Lyndon, living for a short time in a house just west of where the Baptist church now stands. They soon bought George Peck's farm a little farther west where they lived five years. They then moved to Onion River and bought the Dr. Mallory farm. After Mr. Mead retired from farming he lived at Onion River across the road from the store.

* Major Mead, born August 27, 1810 married *Betsey Robinson, born May 3, 1811 in Putnam Co., New York on October 18, 1828. After their marriage they raised a family in NY and moved to Wisconsin, landing at Sheboygan on June 9, 1850. Betsey Mead was the daughter of Peter Robinson who was born in Dutchess Co NY on May 8, 1761. During the Revolutionary War he served under Benedict Arnold—before Arnold became a traitor. Betsey was always proud of this heritage and of being an original daughter and an early member of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Children of Major and Betsey included Clarke R Mead, Phoebe (Mrs Charles) Wright, Meliza B (Mrs Charles) Butters, Smith Worden Mead, Jennie (Mrs Rev Walter D) Wells, Abel Mead and Ira Mead (d.1864).

ORIGINAL DAUGHTER OF THE REVOLUTION

Was Remarkable for her Bodily Health and Unimpaired Faculties—Had Lived in the Town of Lyndon Over Fifty-three Years—Never Been More Than Slightly Ill.

Although ninety-two years old, Mrs. Betsy Robinson Mead, might be said to have died while she was still young; young in body and mind, with a step as elastic as one fifty years younger, an eye as bright as a girl's, a memory unimpaired and a mind as

keen as that of a person who is in the prime of life. Never feeling bad enough to call herself sick she was up and around the day before she died. In this she was like her father who lived to be eighty-nine, and the day before his death went to the barn, harnessed up his horse and drove three miles to the Baptist church where as deacon, he passed around the bread and wine for communion. She was a most active person, always busy. During her ninetieth year she knit eighteen pairs of mittens, twenty pairs of socks, and quilted some of them herself. One of the quilts she sent to her great grandchild, Cary, son of Rev. and Mrs. W. S. Sweet, missionaries at Hangchow, China. The week before she died she spent in Plymouth and while there knit lace, pieced patchwork and did all of the

Mr. and Mrs. Mead celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary shortly before he died; his death occurring sixteen years ago when he was seventy-six years old. Seven children were born to them of whom but two survive, C. R. Mead of this city and Mrs. Charles Wright of Delavan.

Walking or riding on horseback over Indian trails was the only way of getting from place to place in the interior of the county when the Mead family moved to Lyndon. Mr. Mead owned the first horse in the town and at one time rode horseback to Milwaukee to buy Indian land of Solomon Juneau. The land thus bought is in the town of Sherman, just across the line from Lyndon, west of where Jos. Bates now lives. On this land there were often as many as 300 Indian wigwams pitched, and even after Mr. Mead owned the property they sometimes came back and staid a few days. An Indian burying ground was on the land, but later when Mr. Mead wished to build a house there, he disinterred the bodies, placed them in boxes and buried them in a gravel bank.

On Thursday afternoon in the house at Onion River where Mrs. Mead had lived so long, she fell asleep to awake in the eternal home above. She had long been a member of the Baptist church and after short services at the house at half-past ten Sunday morning, the body was taken to the Lyndon Baptist church where Rev. E. E. Dresser of Sheboygan Falls conducted services, delivering a most appropriate sermon. The remains were interred in the cemetery adjoining the church, a short distance from where a little over fifty-three years before she spent her first day in the county a town which was to be so long her home. Mrs. Mead's grandsons and the husbands of her granddaughters acted as pall bearers; they were M. C. Mead, Ezra Butters, Edward Wells, Andrew Whiffen, C. D. Eastman, and Dr. W. Robertson. As the coffin was

being lowered into the grave the grandchildren sang, "Shall We Meet Beyond the River?" A large number of friends and relatives, including the great grand children, were present at the funeral services.

Grandma Mead, as she was familiarly known, was highly esteemed and she was one of the kindest and most agreeable of persons, always ready to do a kindness for a friend, and will be greatly missed by her acquaintances. On Monday her relative to this city received a letter from a chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. The writer of the letter stated that there is but one other original daughter of the Revolution still left in Wisconsin and she is now living in that city, but it is thought that she can survive only a short time.

Clark R Mead was born in Putnam Co, N Y on April 6, 1836, a son of Major and Betsy (Robinson) Mead. He is one of their 9 children. Some of his siblings are Meliza Mead (Chas) Butters, Smith W, Phoebe Mead (Chas) Wright, and Jennie Mead Wells, wife of Rev Walter D Wells.

Major, born in NY on Aug 27, 1810 came to Wisconsin in 1849. His wife, Betsy Robinson, who was born in NY on May 23, 1811, was the daughter of Peter Robinson, a soldier in the Revolution. This made her a "Real Daughter" according to the DAR. She remembered Benedict Arnold.

Clark R Mead married Mrs Permelia A Peck at age 26 on Jan 26, 1863. She was born in Rensselaer Co, NY on Dec 3, 1834. Her parents were Ranford and Permelia (Thorn) Peck. Ranford was a drummer boy in the War of 1812. The 12 children of Ranford include George W, Eliza (Wm) Cleveland, Mrs Permelia Mead and Joseph Peck.

The first husband of Permelia was Abel Mead, brother of Clark R Mead who she married on Dec 9, 1854. Their 2 children were Major who became a well known attorney and Elizabeth who died at age 21. Abel died Oct 2, 1859. Clark and Permelia had 5 children including Amy, who married Charles D Eastman, Mary P, Pearly W.

Clark R. Mead, Who Came to Sheboygan County in 1819, Answers the Final Summons.

Clark R. Mead, an honored and respected pioneer resident of Sheboygan county, died Monday, Nov. 4, 1907 at his home in Plymouth, aged 71 years. He had been confined to the house for five or six weeks past and death was due to consumption. *NOV. 6, 1907*

Mr. Mead was born in Putnam Co., N. Y., Apr. 6, 1836 and in 1849 when thirteen years of age came with his parents, to Sheboygan county, settling in the town of Lyndon. He was educated in the common schools and at the age of 26 years he was married on Jan. 26, 1863, to Mrs. Permelia A. (Peck) Mead, widow of the late Abel Mead, who died Oct. 2, 1860.

Mr. Mead was a life-long republican and has held many local offices of trust, the duties of which he performed with honor to himself and fidelity to the public. Both himself and wife were consistent members of the Lyndon Baptist church and have always taken an active part in church and Sunday School work. He has often been called upon to serve as administrator of estates and has so handled the many thousands of dollars that have passed through his hands that no word of complaint has ever been made. Mr. Mead retired from his farm in Lyndon about fifteen years ago and moved to Plymouth, where he has devoted most of his time to the real estate business. His worldly possessions of which he held a goodly share were acquired by honest and industrious effort.

Besides his wife he leaves two daughters, one the wife of Charles D. Eastman, president of the Plymouth Exchange Bank and the other the wife of Dr. R. W. Robertson, also of Plymouth. Major C. Mead, the Plymouth attorney and member of the board of regents of the university is a stepson of the deceased.

The funeral took place today (Wednesday) at 10:00 o'clock at the house and at 12:00 o'clock at the Lyndon Baptist church, the Rev. Elmer E. Dresser, of the First Baptist church Sheboygan officiating. Interment in the Lyndon

Released From The Cares of Life

Demise of Mr. Clark R. Mead.

Early Monday morning came the simple announcement that Mr. Clark R. Mead was no more. The end had come at about four o'clock, and the closing chapter of a useful life had been told. The summons did not come unannounced, as it was known for days that he could not last much longer. He himself was conscious of his condition, but very thoughtfully sought to spare his family pain by appearing cheerful. Not a cloud obscured his reason, and he passed into eternity with every mental faculty serene and clear. His body had seemed frail for several years, but he fought bravely against the ailment which was robbing him of strength, by an indomitable will power pro-

longed his existence. About two years ago his friends had almost relinquished hope that he would recover from a very severe illness, but he rallied. His triumph over death was made possible by a body untainted by any suspicion of impurity or intemperance and by a will whose remarkable strength was often observed.

Mr. Mead was born in Putnam county, New York, on April 6, 1835, his parents having been Major and Betsey (Robinson) Mead. His grandfather served in the Revolutionary war. The Meads can trace their lineage through colonial times to the days when their ancestors were still residing in England. Mr. Mead's parents came west with their family in 1849, landing at Sheboygan. From that place they went to the town of Lyndon, the history of which when written would be very incomplete without the name of Mead. The coming of the family to Wisconsin is told by the "Biographical Record" of the county as follows: The father of this family was born in New York, August 27, 1810, and in 1849, started with his family for Wisconsin, traveling from Poughkeepsie to Albany by boat, to Buffalo by way of the Canal, and by lake steamer to Wisconsin. On reaching Sheboygan he found it a mere hamlet, and old Deacon Brown kept hotel on Pennsylvania Avenue, then the principal street. Mr. Mead rented land, and after six months purchased a partially-improved tract of one hundred and sixty acres, moving into a log cabin which was built by the owner of Mrs. Clark Mead. About three hundred Indians were encamp-

near by, and Mr. Mead purchased eighty acres of his land from the old Indian chief, paying \$300 for it. An Indian cemetery occupied the place upon which he erected his buildings, and he removed many of the Indian graves from their burial-ground. Clark, then a boy, would often place arrows upon a stick for the little Indians to shoot at with bows and arrows, and if they hit the mark the arrow was given them. Deer was plentiful and other wild game abundant. Mr. Mead was successful in business, and increased his possessions until he owned five hundred and seventy acres in Lyndon Township. He cast his first Presidential vote for Henry Clay, and was a Whig until the organization of the Republican party. He and his wife were prominent members of the Baptist church.

Mr. Mead was only thirteen years old when he came to Sheboygan county and his education was gotten in the common schools. When twenty-six years of age, in 1863, his union with Mrs. Fernelia A. (Peck) Mead took place. This was Mrs. Mead's second marriage, she having been the wife of Abel Mead, a brother of the one whose demise it has become our very painful duty to chronicle. They continued to reside in Lyndon where Mr. Mead engaged in buying and selling stock and acting as administrator of several estates. In 1894 they came to Plymouth to reside, and here they have lived ever since. Mrs. Mead and three children survive as follows: Former Senator M. C. Mead, who is prominent as an attorney and is serving his second term as a regent of the State Uni-

versity, and was for a time president of the board of regents; Mrs. C. D. Eastman, the wife of the president of the Exchange Bank of Plymouth and president and manager of the Plymouth Refrigerating, Water Light and Power Co.; and Mrs. R. W. Robertson, wife of Dr. Robertson, the dentist. Mr. and Mrs. Mead have been called to mourn the death of four children. Of these three will be well remembered by many of the readers of this paper—Miss Elizabeth, Mrs. Phoebe (Mead) Nancy and Pearlcy. The last named had just completed a course in the Waldo school and had decided to take up the profession of law, when he was taken away. He was a bright, promising young man and his passing was a very severe blow to the fond parents.

Mr. Mead had always taken a prominent part in the affairs of his town and was frequently honored by his neighbors with responsible positions. He was for many years a member of the school board of the Waldo district, was chairman of the town board of Lyndon, and was entrusted with probate matters. When he retired from farming he dealt in real property and continued to be frequently appointed administrator of estates.

Although he was engaged in the real estate business for many years and was appointed to settle up numerous estates, he was never suspected of committing one iota to his discredit. Scores of transfers of property had been made through him with the result that people's confidence in his honesty was increased. They came to rely upon his honesty with perfect confidence. In disposing of a farm or house and lot, he applied the golden rule, as he did in all his dealings with his fellowmen.

He was a man of great energy and perseverance and relied for success upon these and his excellent judgment concerning the value of property, rather than on being able to take advantage of men. Even when his final illness seemed likely to enforce a period of rest upon him, he was not idle. He completed real estate deals which he had undertaken while his health still permitted him to be out. His financial condition did not necessitate his working thus, but his nature did not allow him to settle down to ease. He was constantly impelled to activity.

In his death Plymouth and Sheboygan county have lost one of their most useful and most highly valued

citizens, one who was esteemed and respected for the possession of those qualities which constitute true manhood.

The burial takes place today from the family residence and the remains will repose in the Baptist cemetery in the town of Lyndon. The Rev. E. E. Dresser of Sheboygan officiates, and Kessel & Kiefer of this city have charge of the obsequies.

Mr. Mead leaves seven grandchildren. The Rev. Dresser delivered a brief eulogy of the deceased, and his words found response in the hearts and minds of those who heard them. He spoke of Mr. Mead's hopeful nature, and how serenely he met his death. He dwelt upon some of the excellent traits in the character of the departed, saying that it was a pleasure for him to be useful to others.

Regretfully, but not with surprise, it was heralded over the city last Monday morning that one of her well known citizens, Mr. Clark R. Mead had passed from the vicissitudes of earthly portals to that of death's peaceful slumber. The end was calm and peaceful, the sequel of the life he had lived. That life's vitality was slowly ebbing away had been apparent to the family and friends for some months, and it was for this reason that no surprise was occasioned when it was announced that his spirit had been ushered into the life immortal.

We reprint the following sketch concerning the deceased from the Sheboygan County Biographical Record of 1894:

"Clark R. Mead is numbered among the pioneer settlers of Sheboygan county of 1849. He now follows farming in Lyndon township, or what is known as Onion River, where he owns and operates 160 acres of valuable land. He was born in Putnam county, N. Y., April 6, 1836, and comes of a family that traces its ancestry back to the days of "Merrie England." His parents

were Major and Betsy (Robinson) Mead. They had four sons and three daughters, of whom five are now living: Meliza, wife of Charles Butters, a prosperous farmer of Lyndon township; Clark R., Smith W., who is also represented in this volume; Phoebe, wife of Charles Wright of Lyndon township, and Jennie, wife of, Rev. Walter D. Wells, a Baptist clergyman of Kendall, Wis., now in Onion River.

"The father of this family was born in New York, August 27, 1810, and in 1849 started with his family for Wisconsin, traveling from Poughkeepsie to Albany by boat, to Buffalo by way of the Canal, and by lake steamer to Wisconsin. "Clark R. Mead was a lad of thirteen when he came to Sheboygan

county and was educated in the common schools. At the age of twenty-six he was married, January 26, 1863, to Mrs. Permelia A. (Peck) Mead who, with the following children survives him: Amy, wife of Charles D. Eastman, living in the town of Plymouth; Mary P., the primary teacher in the Waldo High school, and Major Mead of this city.

Since casting his first presidential vote for Abraham Lincoln, Mr. Mead has been a stalwart republican and has served as chairman of the township board for two years. He has been district clerk of the schools and clerk of the Waldo High school."

During his residence in our city, the deceased was actively engaged in the real estate business, and in such was straightforward and reliable. It was this fact that made him a desirable agent for realty and many large transactions were made by him.

His home life showed the beauty of his character at all times. Dearly he loved the members of his family and grandchildren and if ever an opportunity presented itself to add to their happiness, it was never lost. To his fellowmen he showed a like spirit and placed honesty at a premium far in advance of pecuniary gain or advantage.

The funeral was held from his late home Thursday morning, Rev. E. E. Dresser of Sheboygan conducting the service. The remains were then taken to the Baptist cemetery in the town of Lyndon for interment.

Besides the widow, three children survive as follows: Attorney M. C. Mead, Mrs. C. D. Eastman and Mrs. R. W. Robertson, all of this city.

Mead had made such headway as to come into possession of some valuable land and, with the right ideas, these lands were made to yield crops that brought him assurance that a good living was to be had in farming. How well he had succeeded can be understood by those of his friends who have witnessed the progress made, he and his wife having enjoyed the fruits of their labors in an extremely pleasant way for several years. On December 25th, 1860, Mr. Mead was married to Miss Georgianna Sprague at Sheboygan Falls and to them were born three children, two girls and a boy. On the 27th of March, 1896, the family were called to mourn the death of their beloved son, Chester, who had moved from Milwaukee to the old homestead in the Town of Lyndon but a few days prior to his demise. Their daughter, Mrs. A. J. Whiffin, has been matron at the County Asylum for several years, and their daughter, Josephine, is the wife of the Rev. Sweet, both of whom returned from their missionary work in China nearly three weeks ago, two days before the illness of Mr. Mead, which was on May 4th. Of Mr. Mead's relatives, he leaves his mother, whose age is 87, and she is tenderly cared for at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Chas. Butters, in the town of Lyndon. Mr. C. R. Mead of Plymouth was his only brother living. Abel and Ira having gone before some years ago. Mesdames Melissa Butters, Phoebe Wright and Jennie Wells (deceased) are his sisters. The relatives who were at his bedside when he departed this life were: His wife, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Whiffin, Mr. and Mrs. Sweet, Miss Josephine Shaw, Mrs. Chas. Wright, Mrs. (Chester) Delia Mead and Miss Mary Brown, a friend of the family. Alpheus and Zilpha (Wright) Miller were the parents of four children; Sarah who died at 5 months and Phoebe, born on July 18, 1846 who married Benjamin Halter on April 28, 1875. We have no names for the other two, who died young. Alpheus was born in 1815 and Zilpha in 1807. The family came to Wisconsin from Dutchess County, NY.

In the early days Alpheus was known as a stock dealer and a great cattle drover. When the Millers came to Wisconsin in 1847 they settled in Abbott/Sherman Township Here he pre-empted a piece of raw timber land, and erected a log cabin with an old-fashioned fireplace and puncheon floor. Wild berries grew plentifully around the home. Cows wandered the forest and wore bells so they could be found. Indians and their wigwams were found near the settlers. There were deer and sometimes bears in the area. Rafters of their log cabin were often hung with pieces of dried venison. Honey was easily found. By the time Phoebe was 16 she was teaching school. The 3 Millers and the Halters are buried at Lyndon Cemetery.

was tied, was three quarters of an inch in diameter and the other, which was tied to a beam above one of the horse stalls, was three-eighths of an inch in diameter. From the way in which the body was hanging when it was found, it appears as though deceased climbed up on a partition between two stalls and jumped off.

Besides his wife, deceased is survived by two daughters, Lillah and Jessie, living at home, two sons, Albert, residing on a farm at Onion River, and Troeter, a minister residing in Royalton, Wis., as well as three brothers and three sisters. Operated Farm at Onion River Twenty-Three Years; Retired Year Ago and Rented Property to His Son—Was Treasurer of Town Lyndon, Served as Member of School Board and Held Office in Canning Company

Johannes Oosterhuis, of Onion River, adjoining Waldo, who committed suicide sometime yesterday morning by hanging himself in a barn on the farm which is being operated by his son, Albert, was one of the most prominent, most progressive and substantial farmers in the county of Sheboygan.

Through strenuous and energetic efforts, he acquired a large farm in the town of Lyndon and he developed it until it became one of the most valuable farmsteads in the county. Recognizing his value to the community, the voters of Town Lyndon elected him to the responsible position of treasurer of the town in which capacity he served for some time. His last term in that office expiring in 1904, he was later elected a member of the school board and served his constituents well in that capacity. In addition to the trusts imposed in him by the voters of the township, his ability and integrity was appreciated by the Waldo Canning company of which he was a big stockholder to the extent that he was serving as treasurer of that company until a year ago in January.

year ago in January. Johannes Oosterhuis, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Oosterhuis, pioneers of Sheboygan county, was born in the town of Lima on March 23, 1864. He was one of a family of ten children of whom three brothers and three sisters survive. He had always lived in Sheboygan county and had operated his farm at Waldo for 23 years, retiring last year and renting it to his son, Albert. He then purchased a dwelling from William Ackland at Onion River, town of Lyndon, and was residing there up to the time of ending his life. He married Miss Minnie Bloomer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sebastian Bloomer, town of Holland, on March 16, 1888, and four children, two daughters and two sons, were born to them.

Commenting on the death of Mr. Oosterhuis, Rev. George A. Tennant, pastor of the Methodist church, who was well acquainted with the deceased, said, "Mr. Oosterhuis was a quiet and unassuming, honest and industrious man. He had made a success of his farm business and won for himself a large place in the affections of his many friends and the esteem of the entire community.

"His death cast a pall of sadness and gloom, not only over his own family and relatives, but over all who knew him. He had been in failing health for about two months and this brought on despondency, which, evidently, was the direct cause of his death."

According to other friends of Mr. Oosterhuis, he had been acting strangely the last week or so and it was believed that he was beginning to lose the control of his mind.

Yesterday morning at about 7 o'clock Mr. Oosterhuis went over to his son's house, a quarter of a mile from where he lived. His son and a farm hand were preparing to go into the field to do some seeding, but were finishing with the chores in the barn before they left. Mr. Oosterhuis told Albert to leave the chores and go into the field and that he would finish the work in the barn. This promise he kept. He completed all of the work in the barn before he hung himself.

At 11:45 o'clock Albert Oosterhuis and his helper returned from the field for dinner and as they entered the barn door their eyes met the sight of the deceased hanging from a rope near a partition in one of the horse stalls. They cut the rope and then a doctor was called, but life was extinct by that time and Coroner William Von Zehlen of this city was summoned. The body was taken to the home of the deceased in a truck owned by R. H. Wierman, Waldo miller and later undertaker George Wittkop of Plymouth was called and the body removed to his morgue.

Two pieces of rope tied together were used in the hanging. One piece, the one in which the noose



Leroy and Gerdeina are buried at Lyndon Cemetery. Both were born about 1828. He died in 1889 and she died in 1905. No other facts have been found about them. However Mrs R. B. Clark, also buried there, was married first to Arzy/Urza Palmer and Mrs Clark's daughter, Helen Palmer Payne Mead Janssen is also buried at Lyndon Cem. It is probable that Leroy and Arzy are brothers, or at least relatives. Their ages fit, since Leroy was born about 1828 and Arzy's wife was born in 1822, they must be of the same generation. Arzy was married on Jan 11, 1846 (his wife's given name is never mentioned) at Alabama, NY and in 1847 they came west to Farmington, in Washington Co. until they moved to Town Scott, Sheboygan Co. in 1854. William Henry Payne, born December 24, 1836 in New York and died Jan 2, 1881 of pneumonia, married Helen J Palmer on June 10, 1869. Helen was born September 10, 1850 and died December 21, 1912 after later marriages to Milan Mead and Steve Janssen. All but Steve are buried together at Lyndon Cemetery, along with 2 young sons of William & Helen Payne. They were Gary H Payne, born April 2, 1876 and died April 7, 1877 and Robert Payne, born Sept 29, 1878 and died a week after his father, on January 8, 1881. William had become ill over the Christmas holidays while they were visiting Helen's parents in Town Lyndon. There was a daughter, Gay H, born June 15, 1873 who married William H Snyder and is survived by a group of descendants. After William's death, Helen left Gay with her step-sister, Mrs Couch (aka Aunt Rindy) who lived in Glenbeulah and tried to support Gay and herself by selling cosmetics and magazines door to door.

William Payne

William Payne was born on Dec. 24, 1836 in New York, the son of Clark and Mary Payne who were born in England, lived in Schenectady and Ballston Spa, NY and came to Dodge Co., Wisconsin about 1848 but after 1850 returned to New York. In 1857 they came back to Town Mitchell. William Henry enlisted in the army on August 11, 1861 and was mustered out on December 1, 1868. We believe he served longer than or at least as long as any County soldier. First he was in Captain D B Conger's Company B, 8th Regiment, Wisconsin Infantry, which had as its mascot the famous Eagle known as "Old Abe" which would fly high overhead whenever there was a battle. They were fighting along the Mississippi River. In August 1862 he transferred to Co F, 2nd Battery, US Light Artillery where he enlisted for a five-year term. After the war the 2nd Artillery went to the west and in May 1868 he was transferred to Battery L and on December 1, 1868 he was discharged from Fort Vancouver, Washington Territory.

Ransford & Permelia Thorn Peck Family

GEORGE W. PECK.

A Sheboygan County Pioneer Who Passed Away at the Ripe Age of Eighty-Two. MAY 4, 1904

A brief mention of the death of George W. Peck, was made in these columns last week, he having died just as the NEWS was going to press.

George W. Peck, was born at Sand Lake, Rensselaer Co., N. Y., June 30, 1822. In 1845 he was married to Harriet Sweeting. He came west the same year without his wife, intending to return for her later, but she did not live to come to Wisconsin. On Feb. 3, 1853, he was married to Mrs. Amy Meacham, a native of Brattleborough, Vt., who came from Jefferson Co., N. Y., in 1846 to the town of Lima this county, where her husband died Sept. 24, 1849. Mrs. Peck died Aug. 7, 1903 at their home in this village. Mr. Peck was one of the early pioneers of Sheboygan county, having lived in different parts of the county nearly fifty-eight years. He first lived in Lima and Lyndon, but over thirty years ago he moved to what is known as the Alice Best farm near Riverside, then to the Peck farm southeast of the village, and for the past twenty years or so he had been a retired resident of this village. In the early days Mr. Peck took an active interest in church matters, was a contributor to the support of the church and a regular attendant until his failing health confined him to the house. He hadn't been down town since last September, the month following his wife's death. Although he required constant care for months, he was only confined to his bed about two weeks and was unconscious the last two days. He was an honest, upright citizen and leaves a creditable life record as a legacy to the relatives who survive him, among whom are four brothers, Gilbert, of Great Bend, Kan.; John at the Milwaukee Soldiers Home; Charles, of Rowland, Ala.; Joseph C. Peck of Waldo; and two sisters, Mrs. Ediza Cleveland, of Ourtown, and Mrs. C. R. Mead, of Plymouth, Wis. There are also in this village a nephew, Charles G., and two nieces, Ella and Hattie Peck, who have been a source of great help and comfort to him in his declining years, and to Miss Ella especially, who for many years has had the responsibility and



Funeral Thursday


For 67 years she had been a member of First Congregational Church in Plymouth, a past church clerk and a member of the Women's Fellowship of the congregation.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Atty. Clark M. Robertson, of Milwaukee; one daughter, Mrs. Beth Fairbanks of Plymouth; seven grandchildren, two great-

grandchildren; three brothers, Dr. Arthur Robertson of Janesville, E. E. Robertson of Portland, Ore., and Dr. Frank Robertson of Largo, Florida.

His parents, four sisters, and four brothers preceded him in death.

The Noah & Huldah Robinson Family

Noah and Huldah Kelly Robinson were the first generation of the Robinsons to come to Sheboygan County. Noah was born around 1798 and died about February 20, 1879. He married Hulda Kelly who was born around 1801 in New York State. She died at the age of 59 years, 1 month and 2 days on Sept. 9 or 18, 1860. They came to Wisconsin in 1847 with their son Henry Harrison who was born on Jan. 2, 1824 & was the oldest of their 10 children. WILL OF MRS. ROBINSON.

Distributes an Estate of Sixty to Seventy-five Thousand Dollars. \$30,000 Goes to Orphans Home, \$10,000 Each to Mrs. James Slyfield and L. H. Baldwin, Brother and Sister of Deceased.

Sheboygan Telegram:—James Slyfield has been appointed executor under the will of the late Mary E. Robinson, relict of the late Henry H. Robinson, who died at the home of her sister Mrs. James Slyfield of this city December 19th last. The estate is one of the largest that has passed through the county court in recent years, valued as it is between \$60,000 and \$75,000 and consisting mostly of personal property, such as mortgagee, stocks, bonds, though about \$8,000 to \$10,000 is real estate located in this city and county. There is also real estate in other parts of the state and also in the West.

The will provides for about twenty individual legatees but the bulk of the estate, to be precise one half, goes to the Christian Home Association at Council Bluffs, Iowa, to comply with the request of the testator's only son that his share of his father's estate after his mother's demise be bequeathed to this corporation which conducts an orphanage of a non-sectarian character at that place. The sum of the bequest is ordered to be used in the erecting of a cottage or building to be known as the Robinson Memorial.

Her sister, Mrs. Della E. Slyfield receives \$10,000, a like amount going to her brother, Levi H. Baldwin of Hingham. Another sister, Helen D. Birds-eye of Sanquoit, Oasida county, New York, is to have \$5,000 and \$1,000 is to be held in trust for the support and maintenance of her mother and the principal is to be divided at her death.

The balance of the estate is divided in various amounts among the several legatees, the testator giving explicit directions even to the disposal of small trinkets like cuff and collar buttons, worn silver spoons, etc. Should there be any remainder after the bequests have all been paid as directed the balance is to be divided into three equal shares, one going to Della E. Slyfield, another to Helen D. Birds-eye and the third to Levi H. Baldwin after the Christian Home association aforementioned has received another \$10,000.

The law firm of Maynard and Dattling appear as attorneys for testator and has also been retained by Jas. Slyfield, the executor who is serving without bonds and who is given the sum of \$1,000 for his services by the terms of the will.

Mrs. Mary Robinson, who was one of the pioneer residents of the town of Lyndon, died at the home of her sister, Mrs. James Slyfield in Sheboygan Friday morning, Dec 19. The remains were brought to Lyndon cemetery and laid beside her husband and only son on Sunday Mrs Robinson was in her 65th year and will be remembered by her many friends here as a thoughtful and kind friend, who in time of need always gave a helping hand

"Aunt Rie" Robinson (Eli)

Mr. Henry Robinson of Lyndon died at his home last week Thursday evening, Jan. 8th, aged about 66 years. Deceased was born in Kent, Putnam Co., and was one of the pioneers of the county. Upon his arrival here he settled in the town of Scott and some twenty-four years ago he purchased the beautiful farm on which he lived and died. Mr. Robinson was an exceptionally good man, has been a devout Christian since boyhood. He leaves a wife and son, four brothers and three sisters, besides a multitude of friends to mourn his departure. The funeral occurred Sunday afternoon at the Baptist church and was largely attended.

MRS. A. M. ROBINSON PASSES AWAY HERE

In the death of "Grandma" Robinson, who passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. C. Mead, in this city, Friday evening, July 2nd, another example of that sturdy pioneer stock that braved the trials and vicissitudes of the early history of this county, is vividly brought to our attention. Illustrations of such devotion and sacrifice as the life of Aunt Rie, as she was familiarly known by her neighbors, is seldom found. A loyal and faithful civil war widow under the most trying circumstances fought the good fight unselfishly for the maintenance of her little home to bring up her two small children in those Christian ideals that characterized her whole life.

Born in St. Lawrence County, New York, June 8th, 1842, she came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Bates, to Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, at about seven years of age, and lived in the Town of Scott. On November 12th, 1857, while a girl in her teens, she was married to Elisha J. Robinson at Sheboygan Falls, and to them was born the two daughters who survive, Mrs. Rose R. Mead, this city, and Mrs. Amy Brown, who resides in Colorado.

Notwithstanding leaving a wife and two small children when the war broke out in 1861, Elisha Robinson volunteered his services to his country, and served in the Union Army for three years, and died from sickness while in a Southern camp. Only recently the writer was told by "Grandma" herself how she spent nearly the last dollar she had to have her husband's body brought back here for burial, and they are now resting side by side in the Lyndon churchyard near Hingham, this county.

After her husband's death in the country's service she continued the battle of life for the perpetuation of a united American home, and finally at the age of four score and four surrendered to the same conqueror from whom none ever escape, and was buried on the great American day, July 4th, 1926, to be enrolled with the patriots who had gone before. Rev. H. S. Webster, of St. Paul's Episcopal church, had charge of the services.

With the exception of a few years spent with her daughter, Mrs. Brown in Colorado, Mrs. Robinson made her home with Mrs. M. C. Mead in Plymouth.

Besides her two daughters, Mrs. Robinson is survived by five grand children and fifteen great grandchildren.

Mr. Henry Robinson, an early settler of Sheboygan county, died at his residence in the town of Lyndon, a mile or so south of Onion River, on Thursday evening, Jan. 8th, of a paralytic affection with which he had been afflicted for some months. He was a little over 66 years of age, having been born in Putnam county, N. Y., in 1824. He was one of the early settlers of the town of Scott, where he lived for several years, and then sold his farm there and bought a larger one in Lyndon, on which he has lived for nearly or quite a quarter of a century, and made it a very valuable property. A large gathering of neighbors, friends and acquaintances, in token of their sympathy with the bereaved family and respect for the deceased, was in attendance at the funeral at the Baptist church at Onion River, at one o'clock Sunday P. 

He was born in Monroe Co, NY on October 16, 1837, ninth in a family of 13 children born to Lawrence and Jane (Johnston) Sharp. On Sept 3, 1861 he enlisted in Battery L, First New York Light Artillery and assigned to the First Brigade, First Division and First Corps. Battles he fought in included Harpers Ferry, Second Bull Run, Antietam, Gettysburg and Petersburg and several others. He gives a detailed account of his service in the Portrait and Biographical Record book. He was honorably discharged on October 24, 1864.

In 1866 he came to Wisconsin with his widowed mother and sister. He married Sarah A Curtis, who was born in New York on January 9, 1846 on October 15, 1867. They are parents of 4 children Jennie, wife of Edward Colwell; Viola, a teacher; William H and Earl L. Sarah Curtis Sharp is the daughter of John D and Mary Ann (Sponenburg) Curtis. OBITUARY.

The funeral of Mrs. Jason Sharp of Waldo, who died of heart disease at an early hour on the morning of Nov. 3rd, '99, was held from her home on Monday at 1:30 o'clock and was one of the largest attended funerals ever held in the county. The remains were conveyed to the Onion River church where the services were conducted by the Rev. G. W. White of the M. E. church of this city, aided by the pastors of the Hingham and Waldo churches.

Mrs. Mary Ann Sharp was born at Kirkestead, Lincolnshire, England, Oct. 28th, 1838. Mary Ann was the third daughter of Robt. and Ann Lawson who came with their family to this county in the year 1845. She was first married to Adolphus I. Lee, March 14th, 1860 who died Feb. 15th, 1885. Deceased was the mother of four children, one daughter Minerva and three sons Robt. Henry and Ira. On April 14th, 1886 she was married to Jason Sharp who still survives her, also two sons Robt. and Ira Lee of the town of Lyndon, two sisters Eliza McKane of Oregon and Mrs. Caroline Fairweather of Sheboygan, four brothers George, Abraham and Robert of the town of Lyndon and Charles Lawson of Waterloo, Iowa.

Deceased moved with her husband to the city of Sheboygan in Dec. 1891, one year later selling their farm to the late Dr. Collar, buying it back one year ago and moving back on to it on the 8th of Dec, last it being the "Old Homestead" of her father. Thus has passed to her reward one of the old pioneers of the county.

Mrs. Sharp's death was very sudden as she was in usual health on retiring Thursday night but before morning dawned Friday "she was not, for God took her."

The services were held on Monday afternoon from the house and church at Onion River where the deceased had been a member for many years except while residing in this city. The Rev. F. C. Hancock her pastor had general charge and preached the funeral sermon, by request from Matt. 11-28-36 words which the deceased had quoted at a missionary meeting just before her departure. The sermon was appropriate and comforting. Rev. J. M. Trenergy of Sheboygan Falls conducted the services at the house and Rev's G. W. White of Sheboygan and J. V. Cody of Waldo assisted in the service at the church. Mr. White her former pastor spoke of her character and life work. He mentioned as prominent characteristics of the deceased, her tireless energy exemplified by the motto "Do with thy might what thy hands find to do." Her industry well fitted the text of the sermon so suited to a laborer who had long been yoked with Christ in loyal service. Of her abundant hospitality himself and many others could testify.

Straightforwardness in speech and life was a prominent trait. Her words were directly to the point; she hated all shams and circumlocution in speech or deed. It is a comfort to associate with one who can be depended upon; such an one was Mrs. Sharpe. She was loving in home life and abundant in neighborly kindness without ostentation. That this was appreciated is evident from the very large concourse of sincere mourners from about her home and from Sheboygan her former home. She had been for many years a member of the M. E. church being one of the band that tolled to build the church in which the services were held. She was a plain unassuming christian constant at church services and always ready to do her share; not specially emotional but always steady and reliable. Both her husbands were earnest workers in the church and each found sympathy and willing co-operation in her.

Very beautiful and appropriate music was rendered by the choir lead by Prof. Herd of Lawrence University, the friend and former instructor of Mr. Ira Lee. His touching solo will not soon be forgotten. The church was appropriately draped in mourning. A long procession wended its way to the Lyndon cemetery where the beloved neighbor, fellow christian, friend, sister, wife and mother was tenderly laid away in good hope of a glorious resurrection and a joyful reunion with the faithful and loving "When Christ shall appear."

Many beautiful floral offerings were last tokens of remembrance but the true christian character of Mrs. Sharpe will long live in the hearts of her many relatives and friends. A good woman has passed into the beyond.

Miss Elizabeth Sharpe

Miss Elizabeth Sharpe, 77, of Waldo died at the Plymouth Hospital Saturday afternoon following an illness of five months.

She was born Nov. 26, 1876, in Manchester, England, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jason Sharpe. She came to America in September, 1900, settling in Waldo where she had since resided.

She was a member of the Waldo Methodist Church, taking an active interest in church work and Christian service.

Miss Sharpe was also a member of the King's Daughters, Waldo Chapter; the Women's Society for Christian Service; the Women's Christian Temperance Union; and of the Waldo Homemakers.

Other than cousins, there are no immediate survivors. She was preceded in death by two sisters.

Mrs. Meliza Shaw, of Onion River, died December 3d, 1885. She was born in Putnam county, N. Y., Jan. 13th, 1802; was married Jan. 22d, 1820, to Abel Shaw, with whom she lived for 46 years, Mr. S. dying in 1866.

They moved to Sheboygan county, Wis., in the Fall of 1847.

Mrs. Shaw was nearly 84 years old. Rev. R. M. Webster was called to speak at the funeral, which was held on Sunday afternoon last at the M. E. Church at Onion River.

Though the mercury stood below zero and the north-west wind was blowing a gale, yet the church was crowded with neighbors and friends, glad to do honor to the memory of a true and faithful wife and mother and a genuine christian soul.

It was pleasant to hear one and another say: "She was as fine an old lady as ever I knew." "If ever there was a kind heart she had one."

Mr. W. Said: "If we could have a record of the 84 years and set before us every act of service, every word of kindness, every deed of self-sacrifice and devotion; all the patient work, and helpful ministries to husband, children and neighbors, all the heroism of a true wife and mother in the days of struggle, amid the hardships and privations of pioneer life in the woods—if we could see it all, it would seem to us a lovely record, a beautiful history of a noble life."

He said also: "She has not gone away to lose her interest in, and her affection for, her dear ones left behind. May God help us all to be evermore worthy of her admiration and confidence and of a glad and warm welcome from her, and all the beloved ones with her—when our friends here shall say their last farewell." Abel & Meliza Shaw Family

Abel Shaw was born around 1787, son of Joshua and Dorcas Donkafs Shaw at Fredricks-town, Dutchess Co, NY. He married Meliza Robinson, born Jan 13, 1802 on January 22, 1820. At his age it seems improbable, but he is listed as being in the Army during the Civil War. He died, according to records, in 1866 at 72 years and had a GAR marker. Haven't found which is correct information.

Meliza Robinson Shaw died December 3, 1885. She and Abel were married 46 years and came to Sheboygan Co in 1847. Their older son, Albert 1825-1891, preceded them to purchase land on the line between Towns Lyndon and Abbott next to an Indian village. A younger son, Harrison, came with his wife, Olive Colwell, born 1824 and died 1875, and daughter Josephine Shaw, born Feb 26, 1848 to Town Lyndon early in 1849 but Harrison died shortly after on May 28, 1849 at age 22. The daughter, Josephine lived until 1941. She was a teacher.

In September of 1853 Olive remarried to Albert, brother of Harrison and they had five children. Only one, Meliza Sibley (1859-1938) survived to adulthood. The other 4 were Abel D 1856-1864; Olive-b. & d. 1858; Lois 1861-1864; Northrop J 1863-1864. All are buried in Lyndon Cemetery.

From Portraits and Bios

Albert Shaw was one of the early pioneers of Sheboygan County. He was a native of New York State, born in the town of Kent in Putnam County of May 12, 1824. He was reared to farm life and at the age of 22 he started out alone to make his home and fortune. Since the west offered better opportunities he turned that way and arrived in Milwaukee in the fall of 1846. He spent the first winter as hosteler in a hotel in that city and the following spring came to Sheboygan County, making his way through the woods. He bought 200 acres on the town line between Abbott & Sherman, adjoining an Indian village. In the autumn of 1847 his father, Abel Shaw, and family joined him in his new home.

In September 1853 Albert married Olive Colwell, widow of a deceased brother. They had 5 children, 4 died in childhood, only one, Meliza Sibley, survived. He retired 3 years before his death.

Miss Josephine Shaw, Aged 93, Passes Away On Monday

d. Nov 3, 1944

Miss Josephine Shaw, age ninety-three years, died at her home in Waldo, Monday at 9:36 a. m.

Miss Shaw was truly one of the pioneer residents of Sheboygan county. She was the daughter of Harrison and Olive Colwell Shaw, and was born Feb. 26, 1848 in Putnam county, New York. When she was a little over a year old she came with her parents to Sheboygan county. They settled in 1849 on a farm in the present Town of Sherman, then known as the Town of Tabbott. Her father died soon after the arrival of the family, and later her mother married Albert Shaw, a brother of the deceased father and husband.

Not long after the Civil war the family removed to the farm home at Waldo where Miss Shaw died. She was the last survivor of about fifty persons who came together to Sheboygan county from the state of New York, most of the families being inter-related. Her grandfather, Abel Shaw, also came to the county and is buried in the Lyndon cemetery, on Highway 57 a miles south of Waldo. Her great grandfather was a soldier in the Revolutionary war.

Miss Shaw commenced teaching school in Beechwood in 1863 and taught later at Hingham and Waldo, for several years. For many years she lived at home with her parents, taking care of both her step-father and mother in their declining years. Her only sister, Mrs. C. M. Sibley, with whom she made her home in her later years, died in 1938. Her nearest relatives are three cousins, Josephine Sweet in Shauvels, China. Wentworth

Colwell, Cold Spring, N. Y., and Albert Colwell in Minnesota.

The funeral will be held at the home in Waldo on Thursday afternoon, Nov. 6, at 2 p. m. The Rev. Wendell Bennetts, pastor of the Waldo Methodist church, will officiate, and burial will be in the Lyndon cemetery. Miss Shaw was a life-long attendant at that church.

Possessed of a keen mind and an infectious sense of humor, Miss Shaw was a delightful conversationalist, and she retained her mental faculties unimpaired until just a few days before her death. A talk with her, particularly on topics of Sheboygan county history, was a delight to one who was interested in such history.

She could relate vividly scenes of Civil war days in this county, and her comments on those events were invariably fresh and interesting. But unlike many old people, she did not live entirely in the past. She read the daily papers from the first page to the last, and she listened with interest to the radio. Any relative or friend who wanted settled some disputed point of geneology of family history, called invariably on Josephine Shaw. Many of her former pupils, now themselves old people, recall with delight their visits at her hospitable home. To her acquaintances she represented all that the term "a Christian lady" implies, and she will be sorely missed in a community where for many years she has been known as a gracious friend, a comforter in time of trouble, and a good neighbor, one truly loved by all who knew her.

Major and Susan Jane Payne Shaw Family

Major Shaw was born in the 1830s and died at age 33 in the 1870s while he was a member of the Wisconsin State Assembly. The bodies of Susan, Major Neilan and Holton were brought back to Wisconsin to be buried with Major Shaw at Lyndon Cemetery.



DEATH DUE TO A FALL

Charles M. Sibley, a Well Known Farmer and Business Man of Waldo Dies as the Result of an Accident. He Was Fifty-Five Years Old.

The uncertainty of life is forcibly brought to mind in the sudden passing of Charles M. Sibley one of the best known and most esteemed residents of the central part of Sheboygan county, to whom death came at 11:30 p. m. on Monday, Oct. 23, 1911, following an accident last Friday noon when he fell and fractured his skull and he never fully recovered consciousness, although at brief intervals he seemed to be in a semi-conscious state.

Mr. Sibley was working in a new building he was having erected in Waldo for use in his coal and agricultural implement business. Stepping on some loose boards he accidentally fell to the cement floor eight feet below striking on his head and shoulders. He was picked up unconscious and removed to his home on a stretcher. A physician was immediately summoned from Plymouth and subsequently a specialist from Milwaukee. On Monday it was decided to perform an operation Tuesday morning owing to a fracture of the skull, but in the meantime he passed away.

Although the news of the accident had spread over the county, the announcement of Mr. Sibley's death came as a shock and was received with profound regret and the deepest sympathy is felt for the bereaved wife and sisters of the deceased.

"Charlie" Sibley was the eldest child of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clark L. Sibley, respected and worthy pioneer residents of Sheboygan county. He was born on the Sibley farm in the town of Lyndon, on July 18, 1856 and therefore his age was 55 years, 3 months, and 5 days. He was educated in the district schools of the neighborhood and as a young man was for some time engaged in the lumber business with his father at Waldo. On November 23, 1887 he was united in marriage to Miss Meliza Shaw, since which time they have resided on a farm a mile east of Waldo. When his father died about three years ago he assumed charge of his business, that of dealing in coal, lime, cement, etc., and had enlarged the business considerably, handling agricultural implements, buggies, sleighs, etc. He also continued to conduct the farm and at the same time was one of the most active and enterprising men in Waldo where he will be greatly missed both in a business and social way. He was an honored member of the Masonic order and the I. O. O. F. and enjoyed the good will and respect of the entire community. He is survived by his wife and three sisters, Mrs. J. J. Angus of Grand Haven, Mich., Mrs. Albert H. Eckhardt of Menomonee Falls, Waukesha Co., Wis., and Mrs. A. J. Oosterhouse of Waldo.

Mrs. Sibley Of Waldo Is Called To Rest At Home

Mrs. Meliza J. Sibley, a daughter of pioneer residents of Sheboygan county, died at her home in the village of Waldo, on Highway 57, near the Onion River corners, Wednesday, about noon, after an illness of several weeks. Although her condition was serious, her death was nevertheless sudden and unexpected.

Mrs. Sibley was the daughter of Albert Shaw and Olive Shaw, who came to Sheboygan county from the state of New York in the 1850s. She was born in the Town of Lyndon, Sheboygan county, Feb. 26, 1859. On November 23, 1887, she was married to Charles M. Sibley, well-known farmer, and coal, wood and grain dealer of Waldo, who died in 1911.

Mrs. Sibley had lived in what was formerly known as Onion River, since 1869, and since her marriage resided on the farm where she died. She had a wide circle of friends throughout the surrounding community who will miss her genial, happy disposition and her unflinching hospitality. Her many friends and relatives will remember the happy get-togethers at the Sibleys, with their bounteous meals, and the gaiety of their goodfellowship.

Mrs. Sibley attended the Waldo Methodist church. She is survived by only one close relative, a sister, Miss Josephine M. Shaw, who lived with her.



The funeral of Mrs. Jane Spratt, aged resident of the city, who passed away Tuesday evening, will be held at 8:30 o'clock Friday morning from the residence of her son, George Spratt, Lake View. Rev. 

Salmon Vesey, born April 8, 1825 in Ohio came to Lyndon in 1855. He was survived by a wife and 2 sons at the time of his death on Dec. 5, 1893. He and his wife had been in Ohio for a year caring for sick relatives and his body was returned to Lyndon Cemetery for burial.

On Tuesday the sad news came over the wires from Ohio that Mr. S. Vesey died Tuesday morning, Dec. 5th, 1893, at the home of a relative, surrounded by his family, who had gone there to care for him while sick. Mr. and Mrs. Vesey have spent the past year in Ohio caring for sick relatives, but he expected to return home a number of weeks ago, as was reported in the HERALD, but sickness prevented him from coming. During his sickness, which was quite long and painful, he exhibited in a marked degree those traits of Christian character which had characterized him through life and remained with him until the end. Gentle and affectionate, kind and obliging, none knew him but to love him and to love him was to feel the assurance that you were loved in return. He was an ardent earnest member of the church, being converted when quite young. Never more shall we hear the cheerful, happy voice; never see his loved form again. He has left us for a season but we rest in the assurance that our loss is his eternal gain, and that by and by we all shall meet our loved one never to part again. DEATH'S DEMAND. 8-27-1883

Demise of One of the County's Most Promising Young Men—A Brilliant Career Suddenly Terminated—A Former Pioneer's Sudden Demise.

The death of Ernest Vesey, a young man of a most promising future, occurred at his home in Waldo, at ten minutes past twelve o'clock, Tuesday morning. About ten days before his death he was prostrated with an attack of intermittent fever, which, in connection with Bright's disease, from which he had been a sufferer for some years, was the immediate cause of his untimely death.

Dr. Vesey was born and reared in Lyndon and was therefore pretty generally known in the county, and wherever known was regarded with the greatest esteem for his manly worth. He was a young man of far more than average intellectual ability and a few years since began attending a medical college in Chicago, from which he graduated with distinguished honors in March last. Returning home his next step was to fix upon a location for the practice of his chosen profession and what more favorable locality than the community in which he had spent his life and was so well acquainted. He accordingly selected Waldo for his residence and was already building up a rapidly rising practice, although but a few months had elapsed since he first opened his office, when death claimed him and closed almost at its beginning, an enviable career. On the 23d of May, he was united in marriage to Miss Phoebe Mead, of Waldo, one of the fairest and most estimable young ladies in Lyndon. Never was a young couple's future brighter than theirs, only to be so soon interrupted by the cruel and remorseless hand of Death. His demise casts a shadow of gloom over the hearts of all those acquainted with a character of such many noble virtues. He leaves a young wife, a father and mother and two brothers, to mourn his loss. He died at the

Her father was born March 1, 1818 and was a woodman in the Old Country. He came to America with his family, numbering three sons and two daughters, and from New York made his way direct to Sheboygan County. Both he and his wife are still living (1894). Their children are: Mrs Auckland, Thomas-a foreman in the Sheboygan Chair Factory; Rev. Walter D. who attended the Baptist Seminary at Beaver Dam, Wilcox who lives in Lyndon, and Lizzie, wife of Henry Agin, a farmer of Lyndon."-----Wm Auckland was a nephew of Robert Lawson of Waldo.

Born In England

After education in district schools in England, he came to this country as a boy in his teens in September, 1869, and attended the Weyland academy at Beaver Dam, Wis., and the divinity school of the University of Chicago.

Rev. Mr. Wells became a minister in 1886 and preached in a parish near Waldo for a number of years. He came to Sheboygan in 1918, from Kendall, and prior to that time he held pastorates in Omro, Berlin and Whitehall.

The resignation of Rev. Mr. Wells as pastor of the First Baptist church here was tendered on April 29, 1923, with the understanding that it would be effective the latter part of July. So popular was the Rev. Mr. Wells with his congregation that on May 20 of the same year the members voted unanimously to ask him to reconsider his resignation. He retired that year, however, but on frequent occasions since that time occupied the pulpit as retired pastor and also preached in various Baptist churches

Scarcely had we turned with sad hearts and tearful eyes from the bedside of Chester Mead, who had gone to rest, when anxious fears were re-awakened by the news that Mrs. W. D. Wells had been taken ill with the same disease. Sunday morning she arose apparently in usual health and busied herself with home cares until nearly church time when she began to feel ill. Though worried about her condition, Pastor Wells felt compelled to attend to the services of God's house, leaving Mrs. Wells with his son, Wayland, and Grandma Mead. Monday and Tuesday there was little change in her condition, but on Wednesday she became decidedly worse and toward night her case was considered hopeless. The morning hours of Thursday were sad in the extreme, yet blessed because of a strong faith in Christ, which enabled Sister Wells, even though in the shadow of death, to be calm and patient. Perfectly conscious, she conversed freely, making many arrangements, bidding all who came to the house "Good-bye", giving to each a special message, and sending messages to many absent friends. The triumph of

the Gospel was such in her that while momentarily expecting the unseen messenger, she asked her broken hearted husband if he could not sing "Tis so sweet to trust in Jesus." A Pioneer Gone Over The River.

One by one the old pioneer residents of Lyndon drop out from among us in response to the summons that the rest of us must ere long receive. Mr. Joseph Wilcox obeyed that summons at 9:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, March 16th 1897, after a few weeks illness at the good old age of about seventy-nine years. Mr. Wilcox was one of the early and respected pioneers, a good citizen, a genial friend, a kind neighbor and a loving father. Mr. Joseph Wilcox, the son of John and Elizabeth Wilcox, was born June 15th 1818 in Godney Meare Parish, near Glastonburg, Somerset, Shire England. He with his parents, four brothers and five sisters left England March 1838, arrived in Mesopotamia, Ohio May 23rd 1838. April 15th 1845 Mr. Wilcox with five young friends started out with more pluck than money to seek their homes in the wild west. As good luck seemed to favor him as he arrived in Sheboygan County the same year taking up government land in Lyndon near Onion River where he had lived until he was called to pass over the River. In the spring of 1848 Mr. Wilcox returned to Ohio and married Miss Sophia Easton. July 15th of the same year. After marriage the happy couple returned to Lyndon full of courage to make a success in farming which proved true by the nice farm they left for their children. The afflicted family have the sympathy of the entire community in their great bereavement. The deceased leaves one daughter, Miss Lizzie and two sons E. S. and John all of whom remain on the old homestead. Funeral services were held at Lyndon Baptist Church Thursday afternoon at two o'clock; Rev. Wells assisted by Rev. Cadman officiating. The remains of Mr. Wilcox were laid at rest in Lyndon cemetery beside his wife who passed on before him just five months.




