<u>Village Council Elections:</u> Election for two of the five Village Council positions (2-year terms) will be held on **Tuesday, May 2, 2023**. The current Council members whose terms are expiring are Brian Hoffner and Chas Stuart. Hoffner has indicated that he will seek reelection, while Stuart has advised the Council that he will not seek reelection. Please note that the Village Charter Section 9.03 indicates that any Qualified Voter (resident of the Village of North Chevy Chase who is

qualified to vote in Montgomery County and is

registered with Montgomery County Board of Supervisors of Elections or with the Village Council) can seek nomination for the available Council positions by sending written notice to the Nominating Committee (Geetika Sripath at qbhandari@gmail.com) up to one week before the elections, which is **Tuesday**, **April 25**, per the Village charter.

Residents can request absentee ballot and/or vote in-person on **May 2** at the NCC Christian Church. Council members will then be sworn in for new terms at the **May 2** Annual Meeting.

FY2024 Budget: The Village Council reviewed the draft budget for FY2024 at the March meeting. The draft budget and corresponding ordinance will be posted to the Village website and attached to this newsletter as well. The Council will be voting on the budget at the April 18 meeting. Residents are requested to provide any written feedback/comments to the Village Manager in advance of the meeting. Please note that the proposed real property tax rate (0.045) and personal property rate (0.13) of assessed value remains the same and has been since FY18.

Pesticides for Your Yard:

"Petiquette": Please see below for helpful reminders for pet owners. Not every homeowner is a pet owner, so please be a responsible pet owner and be respectful of private property. Avoiding private property is the best way to be a courteous neighbor.

- Keep your pet on a leash.
- Do not allow your pet to wander onto other resident's property.
- If your pet has to go, make sure it does so on common areas, like the curb grass closest to the street. Do not venture into homeowner's yards.
- Pet urine kills plants and flowers. Please be mindful of the community landscaping and your neighbors landscaping.
- Keep our common areas clean, by picking up pet waste and disposing it in your trash can at your home or in Village trash receptacles.

 Please note: that the Village fine for not properly disposing of pet waste is \$100 for the first offense and \$500 for subsequent offenses.

<u>Recyclables:</u> The Village participates in a dual stream recycling program.

Glass/plastic/aluminum go in one recycling container; mixed paper should be placed in a separate container. NO plastic bags of any type should be recycled (even those that say recyclable) – please take them to the grocery store or discard. Additional excluded items are hazardous/toxic product containers, electronics, plastic wrap, Styrofoam, and needles/syringes/health care supplies. In addition, any plastic food or beverage containers that are marked PS (polystyrene) or #6 are not to be included in the recycling. The Village recycling service will not collect waste with any of the above excluded items.

If batteries are being replaced, they need to be recycled properly. Improperly disposed batteries in trash and recycling containers can result in trash fires. To avoid a potential tragedy, residents can bring all types of batteries to the Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) drop-off area at the Montgomery County Shady Grove Processing Facility and Transfer Station. The recycling facility is located at 16101 Frederick Rd. in Derwood. In addition, some retailers also offer drop-off programs to recycle batteries. Check the Call2Recycle (https://www.call2recycle.org/locator/) to find a nearby location.

Taxes: Tuesday, April 18, 2023:

Since April 15 falls on a Saturday, and Emancipation Day falls on Monday, April 17, the tax deadline is moved to April 18.

Please be sure to include the Village of North Chevy Chase as your "city" at the top of your State Tax Return. In the past, Village residents' income taxes have been sent to other municipalities in error due to misfiling. For electronic filers, the Political Subdivision Code for North Chevy Chase is 1618.

Arbor Day Foundation once again Names the Village of North Chevy Chase A Tree City USA

The Village was once again named as a Tree City USA for 2022 by the Arbor Day Foundation (our second year!), in honor of our commitment to effective urban forest management. The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters.

The Village achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

Purple Line: Sewer Line Rehabilitation Work to Start on Chevy Chase Lakes Drive

On or about **April 11**, crews will begin sewer line work on Chevy Chase Lakes Drive between Chevy Chase Lakes Terrace and Hamlet Place. This work will require daily lane closures on Chevy Chase Lakes Drive; however, access will be maintained at all times for both vehicles and pedestrians around the work zone. On-street

parking directly adjacent to the work zone will be limited. Please follow posted signage. Work may occur 7am to 7pm, weekdays and weekends, as needed through May 2023.

Elrich proposes 10-cent property tax increase to fund public education

County Executive Marc Elrich released his recommended \$6.8 billion operating budget for FY 2024. In it, he proposed a 10-cent property tax increase. The current property tax rate is roughly 98 cents per \$100 of assessed value.

The proposed budget must be voted on by the County Council by June 1. If the council approves the tax hike, the increase will provide an additional \$220 million for public schools. The council has scheduled public hearings for **April 11 and April 13**.

The funding from the tax hike would be used to recruit and retain outstanding educators,

teachers, and other essential school staff, address the increase in special education enrollment, and improve student performance. According to the results of the 2022 Maryland Comprehensive Assessment Program test, only 31 percent of MCPS students scored proficient in math, and 53 percent scored proficient in English. About half of the county's budget is allocated to Montgomery County Public Schools.

Residents Asked to Participate in Survey on How to Expand and Improve Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure and Will Offer Webinars on April 13-14

Montgomery County's Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is asking residents to participate in a survey on how the County could expand and improve charging infrastructure for electric vehicles (EVs).

Beginning in 2023, significant funding will be available from Maryland and the Federal government for local governments and private property owners to install EV charging. To take advantage of this opportunity and accelerate the transition to EV ownership, DEP is developing a plan to expand the availability of EV charging throughout the community.

County Executive Elrich to Hold Six 'Community Conversations' to Talk About Long-term Priorities and the Fiscal Year 2025 Capital Improvements Budget

Montgomery County Executive Marc Elrich will hold six "community conversations" at sites around the County in April and May to talk about long-term priorities and how he will address the Fiscal Year 2025 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) budget.

The community conversation events will address how the County Government will make decisions on major projects such as the construction of public schools, building swimming pools, transportation improvements, improvements to sidewalks, improvements to local parks, building parking garages and establishing childcare centers.

County Council Enacts Bill to Establish Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Commission

The Montgomery County Council enacted legislation to establish an Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Commission. The legislation is supported by the full Council, County Executive Marc Elrich and the County's Commission on People with Disabilities. The purpose of this bill is to better coordinate services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) and their families.

The new IDD Commission will have 24 members, including individuals from the intellectual and developmental disability community, service providers, service agencies and the Commission on People with Disabilities.

The commission also will provide educational programs, identify current gaps in services and provide advice and recommendations on best practices to the County and the County Executive.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM MARCH COUNCIL

<u>MEETING</u> (Please note that the official minutes will be posted to Village website upon approval)

Secretary's Report for February 2023 Council Meeting (Mechanick) – Approved.

Treasurer's Report for February 2023 (Joos) -Results for February 2023 included income of \$93,506.70, and operating expenses of \$22,873.31 (including waste removal, trees, street lighting, sign/street maintenance, wages and taxes, professional fees and office and communication). Current fiscal year to date revenues through February 2023 (not including ARPA funds) came to \$489,391.58 and current fiscal year to date operating expenses came to \$192,917.28. No capital expenditures were incurred during February 2023. Total current assets as of February 2023, consisting of operating balance plus reserves, including ARPA funds received, came to \$2,768,193.72. The Village continues to seek further guidance from the Village accountants, as well as the State or Montgomery County regarding the amount of property tax collections and disbursements credited to the Village, in light of conflicting information previously provided regarding the expected amount of such disbursements.

Permits:

 8910 Clifford Avenue – permit approved for construction project under 250 sq. feet; while requiring a site management agreement for the project, the Council decided to waive a security deposit, given limited extent of external disruption from the project.

Action Items:

Antisemitism Resolution – The Council approved a resolution condemning increased incidents of antisemitism within Montgomery County; the Town of Chevy Chase Village had taken the lead on this effort, having encouraged a number of nearby municipalities to join it in adopting similar resolutions.

<u>Village Right of Way Tree Planting</u> – Stadler Nursery has advised that most of the trees ordered have now come in (fifteen trees) and plans are for having them planted on March 24, 2023. Village residents at the affected properties will be notified and provided with Village-supplied watering bags for the trees. The Council expressed interest in continuing the program for the planting of additional trees in Village ROW areas as well, wherever possible, as well as a second round of offering canopy trees to residents to be planted within residential property, as was done previously in FY 2021.

Status Update/Intersection of Kensington
Parkway and Montrose Driveway – The

Village is pleased with the results of conversion of the Kensington Parkway/Montrose Driveway intersection. The Council will further monitor the situation to assess whether additional measures may not be required, including a lighted stop sign. The Village Manager will also check on whether installation of a lighted stop sign would require removal of the pedestrian crossing warning lights previously installed at that intersection, as concerns were expressed that, if that were the case, maintaining the warning lights for pedestrian safety reasons should be the higher priority. As part of this conversion process, the Village also had the stop bars and crosswalk markings at various intersections on Kensington Avenue repainted and the Council decided to authorize the repainting of stop bars at all intersections within the Village.

<u>Village Investments</u> – In light of evolving financial conditions nationally, including the increase in interest rates available on certain investments, the Council has agreed to consider participation in additional low-risk investment instruments offering higher yields than standard certificates of deposit, including the Maryland Local Government Investment Pool (MLGIP) and U.S. Treasury Notes and Bonds.

Council Elections/Nominating Committee -

The Nominating Committee has been constituted and is continuing its efforts to identify residents who will may be interested in seeking election to the Village Council at the upcoming election in May 2023. There are two Council seats up for election this year (in each case for a two-year term). One of the incumbents, Brian Hoffner, has indicated that

he will seek reelection, while the other incumbent, Chas Stuart, has advised the Council that he will not seek reelection.

Budget FY 2024 – The Council reviewed and commented on a draft operating budget that had been prepared for FY 2024, which will then be formally approved at the April 2023 Council meeting. A copy of the draft operating budget will be attached to the April 2023 newsletter distributed to all Village residents, as required by the Village Charter.


