From the Supervisor's Desk

In 1942, Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis wrote that states are the "laboratories of democracy." Indeed, I have thought recently that local governments are truly the laboratories of democracy.

As 2020 ended, we saw holiday cards which essentially said "good riddance," but as 2021 begins, we find our country once more in turmoil. However, I see our local government moving

forward in a collaborative, bi-partisan spirit.

At our Organizational Meeting on January 4, 2021 the Town Board welcomed Jeffrey Judd as our fifth member. We are working together to refurbish the Town Hall, address the Shepherd's Run application and deal with the continuing challenge of COVID-19. It is my intention that we will continue to work towards building consensus to move ahead on issues which concern Copake.

Vaccinations available in Columbia County

The most urgent issue on everyone's mind is how and when they can receive a vaccine. At a meeting of the Board of Supervisors on January 13 we heard from Chair Matt Murrell and Director of the Columbia County Department of Health, Jack Mabb. Both explained that the county is set up to administer vaccines at Columbia Greene College, but it is hampered by the lack of available vaccine. The county has to request vaccine from New York State and receives generally 300 doses at a time. By January 15, the county will have administered 1200 shots, but unfortunately, the county cannot project ahead of time how many doses they will receive, or when.

For the time being, Copake residents should follow this procedure to receive a vaccine:

Go to the Columbia County Department of Health website

at: **columbiacountynyhealth.com/**. Scroll down to the section which says: "Announcements" - and then click on "Learn More." This will bring you to the page entitled "COVID-19 Vaccine Information." Here is the link for that page:

https://apps3.health.ny.gov/doh2/applinks/cdmspr/2/counties?OpID=50502560. Once you are on the COVID-19 Vaccine Information page you will see upcoming vaccination clinics. The listing will say if there are any appointments available. If you see a clinic at which vaccines are available, click on it and register.

At this point, individuals in Group 1A and 1B are eligible to receive a vaccine. In order to know if you are eligible, you can go to: https://am-i-eligible.covid19vaccine.health.ny.gov/

In the weeks to come, vaccines may be available in drugstores in Columbia County. The situation is fluid and constantly changing, but as of now the only way to get a vaccination is to register through the Columbia County Department of Health, and the only way to register is online. The CCDOH cannot predict when the vaccination "events" will be scheduled and so there is no way, currently, to register for a vaccination several weeks in advance. Nor is the county able to keep lists of individuals and call them when a vaccination is available. The only way to get a vaccination at this time is to be pro-active, and go to the website at **columbiacountynyhealth.com/** on a frequent basis. When a clinic is posted, you must register in order to guarantee your appointment.

The county is aware that there are seniors who may not have the capability to register online. At this time, there is a temporary call center, staffed by volunteers who can assist residents. The telephone number for that center is 518-697-5560. Residents can speak to a live person to get their questions answered, but they <u>cannot make appointments</u>. The Office of the Aging will be able to assist senior citizens who are having trouble getting registered for a vaccine, or who do not have transportation to the vaccination site.

The CCDOH is working around to clock to get the vaccinations into the arms of residents. At the Board of Supervisors meeting, the final message was: there will be enough vaccinations - it is just a matter of time. It is estimated that the process of vaccinating everyone in 1A and 1B could take 14 weeks.

At the Town Board Meeting on January 14, 2020 the Copake Town Board unanimously approved a proclamation recognizing the long time service of former Town Clerk/Tax Collector Vana Hotaling. Vana retired on December 31, 2020 after having served the town in various appointed and elected positions for 26 years. In recognition of her service to the town, the Town Board declared that Saturday, January 16, 2020 is to be Vana S. Hotaling Day in the Town of Copake.



In attendance at the Town Board meeting were former Supervisors Angelo Valentino, Reggie Crowley and Jeff Nayer.

The resolution passed by the board is as follows:

Community Workshop for Copake Waterfront Plan

A second community workshop will be held online on Saturday, Feb. 13 from 10am to 11:30am to establish priority goals and projects to enhance the town waterways and hamlets.

The Town of Copake continues to make progress on the waterfront and community plan that seeks to maintain a high quality of life in Copake by increasing access to its main waterways: the Roeliff Jansen Kill, Bash Bish Brook and Taghkanic Creek. Funding has been provided by the New York State Department of State under Title 11 of the Environmental Protection Fund.

The planned online workshop on February 13, 2021 will focus on reviewing progress made on the plan to date, discussing the vision and goals, and soliciting the community's help in prioritizing projects for enhancing Copake's hamlets and waterways.

The draft vision, goals and projects, which were developed based on input at the first community meeting in February 2020, focus on building a healthy town where people of all ages and abilities have access to recreation and waterways, sustaining our longstanding and essential bonds with nature and with our heritage, enriching our lives in vibrant hamlets safely

linked by land and water, and adapting with resilience to changes and challenges.

Does Your Property Flood?

We want to know when and where and how, so we can identify ways to mitigate flooding in our town.

The Town of Copake was awarded funding from the New York State Department of State under Title 11 of the Environmental Protection Fund to develop a waterfront revitalization plan (see https://www.copakewaterfronts.com). The FEMA flood mapping in effect for Copake is dated, so we need your input to better understand the flooding of private property.

Calling All Dog Owners

Kyle Miller is the new local Dog Control Officer for Copake, and he has an important message for all dogs and dog owners to start off the New Year.

This new year means getting used to writing "2021", hanging up a new calendar, and writing down all the important dates on the calendar, including when to relicense your dog! Did you know that New York State requires that you license your dog in the town where you reside once your dog reaches the age of four months? This license is good for one year and could make a difference in being reunited with your pet if it were to run away. All you need is the completed license application, proof of an up-to-date rabies vaccination (unless otherwise stated by your veterinarian), and \$7 (for spayed/neutered dogs) or \$13(for un-spayed/un-neutered dogs). Upon submission, the owner will be provided with a numbered license tag for the dog that MUST be affixed to the dog's collar, which must remain on the dog at all times. P.S. Microchipping is another fast and easy way to vastly increase the chances of your pet being reunited with you if it were to run away or be separated from you. Contact your local veterinarian or the Columbia-Greene Humane Society for more information.



Copake History

The Conklin Family's Sad Departure from Copake

The village of Penn Yan, population 5,159 in 2010, is in Yates County, New York. It lies at the north end of the east branch of Keuka Lake, one of the Finger Lakes. Its name is a syllabic abbreviation of "Pennsylvania Yankee." If you drove today from Copake to Penn Yan, a distance of 258 miles, it would take you about four hours.

The Flour Shop Café and Bakery on Main Street might be a nice place to stop in once the

pandemic is gone. And if you go in, you might just find yourself sitting near some other (sort of) Copake folks, although there's no guarantee they will know their relation to our town.

Here's the story. Those Penn Yan folks with Copake connections are descended from former Copake residents who abandoned our town about two hundred years ago. Why did they leave? Because the rentals (paid in kind, i.e. in crops or livestock) were too expensive and not negotiable. Unable to buy farmland in Copake, they could only be tenant farmers with an almost serf-like status. Their landlords were the Livingstons, wealthy Hudson valley "patroons," who held a monopoly of farmland in Copake and the surrounding areas. They were descended from Scottish born Robert Livingston, who received a large land grant in 1715 from the British crown.

One of the Livingston family's tenant farmers was Jacob Conklin. Jacob, born in 1771, and his wife Catharine Brazie, born 1781, were raised near Copake Lake under the often onerous life lease system of the Livingston Manor. Jake, a broad-shouldered, more than 6 feet tall man, is said to have frequently gifted the Livingston lords with game and fish which he trapped, shot or caught. It is believed, too, that he often accompanied the younger members of the Livingston family as a guide on their hunting and fishing excursions. Thus, for all outward purposes, he appeared to be quite content with his life in Copake. In fact, however, he longed to be free of the Livingstons' claim for rent of the land that he farmed.

In the Conklins' later years, the title to their Copake home was fast running to its end, and the couple and their eight children, Cornelius, Mary, Peter, John, Hannah, Elias, James, and Helen, made the difficult decision reached by scores of other Copake folks in that era - to leave both the land they had known all of their lives and their friends. In their case, the destination would be the Finger Lakes region of western New York. Thus, in 1828, in part influenced by positive reports from their oldest son, Cornelius, who had accompanied some people to the Finger Lakes region, they decided to leave.

After making their way via the Erie Canal and horse drawn wagon, and not in four hours, but some weeks later, the Conklins reached their destination, the town of Penn Yan. There, for \$1000, they purchased 114-acre lot number 50, the "Father Townsend farm," on the Lake road, which was fairly well cleared and had a double log house, an orchard, and lakefront. Catherine died in 1843, after which Jacob remarried. He died in 1853 at age 78. Three of the Conklin children retained some of their Copake ties through marriage. Cornelius married Ann Bevins, Mary married John Benjamin and Helen married John Whitbeck, all of whom came from Copake. Flash forward 168 years. Wouldn't Jacob be surprised that we are discussing him today?

Town Hall Walls Will Tell the Story of Copake's Hamlets

In the near future, the interior walls of Copake's Town Hall will be enlivened and transformed into a virtual history book, telling the collective history of the town's five hamlets: Copake, Copake Falls, Copake Lake, Craryville and West Copake.

The revitalization of Town Hall's interior was initiated by Town Supervisor Jeanne Mettler, who duly appointed a committee to come up with a pragmatic plan to use the building's wall space to tell the unique and varied stories of each Copake hamlet that the Town Hall represents.

The committee members are Peter N. (Nick) Fritsch, a graphic designer and artist who has painted many Copake scenes, Howard Blue, Copake's official Town Historian, who has compiled and curates a vast archive of local history and hosts his *Copake History* Facebook page, and Deputy Copake Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Vana Hotaling. The committee sees this project as a unique opportunity to tell the collective history of the town's five hamlets through assembled historical photographs and succinct narratives about significant

individuals, organizations, businesses and activities that have contributed to Copake's history and development as a beloved home town for many generations. This material will be reproduced on a series of themed panels to be installed throughout Town Hall.

The 18x24 inch "themed panels," will be reproduced on canvas by *CanvasPop*, a highly respected print-on-canvas company. In this way, there will be an overall continuity of presentation. The committee plans to create between 45 and 55 such panels and arrange them by subject throughout Town Hall and the assembly/court room. The total cost is estimated to come in around \$4,000 to \$4,500. At the December 10 Town Board Meeting, the board enthusiastically embraced the project and agreed to look into grants and to help raise additional funds. As part of the planned uniformity of presentation, installation master and all-around wizard, Bob Callahan, is preparing to repaint the Town Hall's interior to harmonize with the basic color-scheme of the panels.

Plaques, objects and citations celebrating significant events and organizations in Copake's past will be incorporated into the new exhibition, as well as reproductions of some of Mr. Fritsch's paintings of iconic Copake locations. Mr. Blue also suggests that objects such as the historic bell, presently in the corner of the meeting room, should be illuminated and displayed more prominently. Other items such as Indian arrowheads uncovered during an archaeological research dig, an original railroad spike from the tracks near the Craryville railroad station, a commemorative illustrated plate, as well as various Copake artifacts from private collections may also be selected for future inclusion.

Though the Copake Town Hall is currently closed to the public except by appointment due to COVID-19, the committee hopes to have the redecoration completed during 2021.


