Having been duly advertised as required by law, the **Regular Meeting** of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Redington Beach, Florida, was held on **Wednesday, June 2, 2020, 6:30 p.m.**, in Redington Beach Town Hall at 105 164th Avenue, Redington Beach Florida.

Approval of Agenda: A motion by Commissioner Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to approve the agenda as presented. No public comment. Motion passed with all ayes.

Public Forum: Steve Miller, 16335 Redington Drive, spoke regarding the overwhelming amount of plastic on the beach and asked if we could borrow the tractor from Madeira Beach to have it picked up, instead of just raking it into the water.

Would like a consensus to move forward with being able to spend approximately \$1,500.00 for the event. The consensus of the commission was to have the event, not to exceed \$1,500.00.

Legislative Update

- Linda Chaney, District 69 Representative spoke on the 3000 bills that were reviewed over the last legislative session and the 275 that passed. The state passed its largest budget of 101 billion dollars, with 2.1 billion going to the environment including restoration, flooding and sea level rise. Also passed was 100 million towards the communities for property and flood insurance.

A motion by Vice Mayor Dorgan and seconded by Commissioner Kornijtschuk to approve the consent agenda as presented. No public comment. Motion passed with all ayes.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Pipe Cleaning: Mayor Will referred to the memo from Attorney Eschenfelder and what the town needs to establish for the town to go out with a Request for Proposal (RFP) on the pipe cleaning. The options would be to put the RFP out in stages or to put the RFP out in one package to include all five phases. Attorney Eschenfelder can put the RFP together to include all phases, but vendors can put in for any or all of the phases. Discussion amongst the commissioners regarding the phases and how the town should proceed. The consensus of the commission is to have Attorney Eschenfelder write the RFP to include all phases and Vice Mayor Dorgan will have numbers of an estimated budget for the next meeting. Evan Soileau, 16107 Gulf Blvd, was in full support of all phases to be done.

B. Duke Energy Lighting Proposal: Commissioner Cariello stated that with the new lights, there would be an increase of approximately \$430.00 per month for the maintenance and rental. AJ Meahl, Lighting Manager with Duke Energy spoke on the eight amber lights that Treasure Island had installed as a pilot program. The lights were approved by both FWC and FDOT for lighting for the turtles and lighting for safety. The additional cost for the town would be approximately \$6,000.00 per year. The lights cost more to manufacture and will have a three sided shield. They will cut down on the brightness and significantly reduce the light pollution.

A motion by Commissioner Cariello and seconded by Commissioner Kornijtschuk to accept the lighting proposal by Duke Energy. Motion passed with all ayes by roll call vote.

NEW BUSINESS

- A. First Reading: ordinance 2021-04: An Ordinance of the Town of Redington Beach, Florida, Amending Chapter 22 (Utilities) of the Town Code to Remove Outdated, Preempted, or Unenforceable Provisions and to Incorporate Current State and Federal Law Requirements and Town Practices; Making related Findings; Providing for Codification, severability, and an Effective Date.** Attorney Eschenfelder read the ordinance by title only. A motion by Commissioner Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to adopt Ordinance 2021-04 on its first reading. Mayor Will noted that this is an overall code review of rewriting the code the commission authorized the town attorney to do. Questions were asked by commissioner's regarding section 22-1(a). - B. First Reading: Ordinance 2021-08: An Ordinance of the Town of Redington Beach, Florida, Amending Chapter 20 (Taxes) of the Town Code to Remove Outdated, Preempted, or Unenforceable Provisions and to Incorporate Current State and Federal Law Requirements; making Related Findings; Providing for Codification, Severability, and an Effective Date.** Attorney Eschenfelder read the ordinance by title only. A motion by Commissioner Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to adopt the ordinance on its first reading. This ordinance is also a rewrite of the current code as part of the overall code review. Commissioner Skjoldager asked about the business tax licenses and if they applied to Uber drivers. Town attorney said no, it doesn't apply, as they are just passing through town. Vice Mayor Dorgan asked how the fees compared to the other towns. Attorney Eschenfelder stated that Redington Beach is low compared to other cities. Motion passed with all ayes by roll call vote.
