Agenda: Mayor Will asked for approval of the agenda. A motion by Vice Mayor Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to accept the agenda as presented. Motion passed with all ayes.

Public Forum: Nick Kordas, 32 160th Avenue, spoke regarding short term rentals.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- A. **Discussion of Ordinance 2022-05 Residents Only Parking Areas:** Mayor Will begin the discussion with prioritizing Beach Parking for Residents, who should be allowed a sticker and the application process. Commissioner Murray suggested that if you own a home, two stickers should be given to the resident. Commissioner Skjoldager noted on page 2 (b) (3), that the last line should be eliminated which states that no more than two permits may be issued for residents. Vice Mayor Kornijtschuk thought the changes were great and that the ordinance is ready to go.

Resident, Annette Gelbrich, 510 161st Avenue asked about rental cars and asked if the name Redington Beach could be not included in the sticker.

Commissioner Cariello noted that the fines should be raised to \$100.00 for first offence and \$200.00 for the second offence. Commissioner Cariello also noted that in 2018 when the ordinance was changed, it originally included 2nd and 3rd Street for resident parking only. He showed a map that was color coded to what is in effect now and what he is proposing.

Linda Soileau, 16107 Guld Blvd, noted that the Sheriff's Office doesn't care if there are people parked illegally. She also noted that if you live on Gulf Blvd and need parking for guests, there isn't room in most driveways. She suggested additional parking on the two islands and allow for visitor parking on 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Streets. She also noted that the town needs to educate the residents on where they are allowed to park.

Nick Kordas, 32 160th Avenue noted that the asphalt in front of his house is private parking and the deputies were called out for the illegal parking. He noted that he is in favor of enhancing the no parking on 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Streets.

Chuck Goldstein, 16208 3rd Street stated he was at the Beach Park over the weekend and only two cars had resident stickers on them, the rest were either laminated on in plastic bags. He also noted that there will be a wedding on July 9th and asked where his guests could park. Mayor Will noted that parking is allowed on the even side of the streets. Commissioner Murray suggested hiring a shuttle to get people to and from the party.

The consensus of the commission was to include 2nd and 3rd Streets as resident parking only. The commission also agreed to move forward with the ordinance to Wednesday's meeting for final reading with the suggested changes.

Sal Licciardi, 16330 Gulf Blvd asked if Town Park was considered public parking or if this would be resident parking only.

Attorney Eschenfelder noted that an ordinance would need to be done on section 21-31 which is the fee schedule to make sure the fees coincide in the ordinances.

With no further business, a motion was made by Vice Mayor Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to adjourn. Regular meeting was adjourned at 6:12 p.m.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- A. Continued and Final Reading; Ordinance 2022-05: An Ordinance of the Town of Redington Beach, Florida, Amending 21-33 of the Town Code (Residents Only Parking Areas) to Revise Parking and Parking Pass Regulations; Providing for Codification, Severability, and for an Effective Date. A motion by Vice Mayor Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to adopt Ordinance 2022-05 on its final reading. Mayor Will stated that this is to prioritize beach parking for the residents. The ordinance also changes the decals to be renewed every year and includes resident parking only on 1st 2nd, and 3rd Streets.

Evan Soileau, 16107 Gulf Blvd had three suggestions for the commission, one to leave resident parking on 1st Street only and eliminate 2nd and 3rd Streets, keep the visitor parking permits and raise fines for the short-term rentals that are abusing the parking.

Commissioner Skjoldager suggested doing a survey and getting feed back from the residents on the resident parking only on 2nd and 3rd Streets. Commissioner Cariello commented that he is seeing more and more people parking on the triangle on 2nd Street and walking to the beach.

Chuck Goldstein, 16208 3rd Street noted that there is a problem with parking on 3rd Street with the short-term rentals.

Kris Johanson, 16347 Redington Drive stated that it seems the commission is trying to solve the short-term rental problem with the parking ordinance. She also suggested a survey.

- B. Duke Energy Lighting:** Commissioner Cariello presented the street lighting survey with 58.8% of the voters approving the light at 163rd and 1st Street. This light is the Type II that Duke Energy recommended, and this will be done throughout the whole town. There is no cost to the town.

Leslie Wilkins, 505 161st Avenue noted that the light in Beach Park needs to be changed out as it still has the bright light installed and is not turtle friendly.

John Hurlburt, 16006 2nd Street noted that there are very bright lights on in the park. Commissioner Cariello will check on this.

Linda Soileau, 16107 Gulf Blvd asked for clarification on the 25' concrete poles that were presented in the proposal.

The consensus of the commission is to go with the Type II lights. Commissioner Cariello will contact Duke Energy and start the process of getting the lights changed out.

NEW BUSINESS

- A. Contract: Holiday Outdoor Décor:** Commissioner Cariello stated that this contract is what the Park Board recommended for the town's Christmas Lights. It is a five-year contract with Clark's at a cost of \$14,210.00 per year. A motion by Commissioner Cariello and seconded by Commissioner Skjoldager to approve the five-year contract. - B. Six Month Review of Financials:** Vice Mayor Kornijtschuk reported that the town is on tracks with its revenues and expenditures. The revenues are at 80% in the general fund, and this is due to collecting 95% of the Ad Valorem taxes. The expenses for all departments are at the 50% mark and don't foresee any unexpected expenses between now and the end of the year.

The Capital Fund has received 120% of its revenues for the year, but this is due to the first portion of the ARPA money the town received. This amount was not budgeted, thus the reason for the inflated percentage. No expenses have been recorded in the capital fund. The only expenses are for the playground refurbishment project, (which is now underway) and the replacement reserves for the roads and streets.

The stormwater fund has collected approximately 35% of its stormwater fee revenue. The expenditures are at 19%, but as the stormwater project moves forward, the expenditures will see an increase.

Other Business

With no further business, a motion was made by Vice Mayor Kornijtschuk and seconded by Commissioner Cariello to adjourn. Regular meeting was adjourned at 7:15 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022 - 07

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF REDINGTON BEACH, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 4 OF THE TOWN CODE CONCERNING ANIMALS TO REMOVE OUTDATED, PREEMPTED OR UNENFORCABLE PROVISIONS AND TO INCORPORATE CURRENT STATE AND FEDERAL LAW REQUIREMENTS; MAKING RELATED FINDINGS; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION, SEVERABILITY, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Town of Redington Beach (the Town) has codified its ordinances over time into a Town Code (the Code) which sets forth the cumulative law of the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board of Commissioners (the Commission) regularly adopts ordinances amending the Code; and

WHEREAS, however, many portions of the Code date back to 1980, with other portions of the Code not having been updated for ten or more years; and

WHEREAS, part of the Commission's duties include the necessity to ensure that the Town's ordinances, as codified in the Code, are up to date, reflect current Florida and federal statutory and case law, that they reflect current actual Town operations, and that they do not contain outdated, redundant or erroneous provisions; and

WHEREAS, in light of the foregoing, the Commission has charged the Town Attorney with the task of conducting a complete review of the Town's Code (excluding the Land Development Code) and to bring forward any recommended revisions to the Code which would alleviate any of the aforementioned potential concerns with the Code's current text; and

WHEREAS, the Town Attorney has submitted his assessment of Chapter 4 of the Code, and has recommended that the Commission make the revisions to that Chapter as are set forth in this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has considered the Town Attorney's recommendations and finds them to be consistent with the goals of the Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Commission therefore finds that it is in the best interests of the Town, and its citizens, property owners and businesses to adopt this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Redington Beach, Florida, that:

Section 1. Sections 4-4 and 4-6 of the Redington Beach Town Code, respectively entitled *Responsibility for animals* and *Nuisance animals*, are hereby repealed in their entirety.

The Codifier shall show these sections as reserved for future use.

Section 2. Sections 4-1 through 4-3, and Section 4-8 of the Redington Beach Town Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4-1. - Town designated bird sanctuary.

The entire area embraced within the corporate limits of the town is designated as a bird sanctuary. To the extent the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission establishes the town as a bird sanctuary, the town shall comply with the requirements set out in Florida Administrative Code § 68A-19.002.

Sec. 4-2. - Hunting or molesting birds.

- (a) It shall be unlawful to trap, hunt, shoot or attempt to trap, hunt, shoot or molest in any manner any bird or wild fowl, or to rob bird nests or wild fowl nests except as may be authorized by rules of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, as authorized by Florida Statutes § 379.104 (the Right to Hunt Act).
- (b) Notwithstanding the foregoing, pursuant to Florida Administrative Code § 68A-4.001(9), starlings may be taken throughout the year.~~If starlings or similar birds are found to be congregating in such numbers in a particular locality within the town that they constitute a nuisance or menace to health or property in the opinion of the board of commissioners, the board of commissioners shall meet with representatives of the Audubon Society, Bird Club, Garden Club or Humane Society, or representatives of as many of such groups as are found to exist within the town, after having given at least three days' actual notice of the time and place of the meeting to the managing officers in such clubs. If, after such meeting, no satisfactory remedy is found to abate such nuisance, the birds may be destroyed in such numbers and in such manner as is deemed advisable by the board of commissioners, under the supervision of the employees of the town designated for such purpose by the board of commissioners.~~

Sec. 4-3. - Animals prohibited at beaches, parks and recreation areas.

- (a) It is unlawful for any person to bring or have or ride or allow on any beach or in the water adjacent thereto any animal.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to bring or have or ride or allow on municipally owned parks or recreation areas any animal. The town shall post notice of the restriction in this section at the entranceway of each municipal park or recreation area, and, if there is no designated entranceway, at any other location convenient to public observation.
- (c) Nothing herein shall preclude a person from using or training a service animal in the open green spaces of the park as provided for in Florida Statute § 413.08. Any person in possession

of such animal is responsible for controlling the animal and cleaning up and properly disposing of any waste. At no time shall such animals be left unattended.

Sec. 4-8. - Maximum number of dogs and cats.

It shall be unlawful to keep, maintain, possess or harbor on any premises within the town more than three dogs and three cats. ~~See Pinellas County Code, article II, animal control, section 14-26 through 14-64, as amended from time to time.~~

Section 3. For purposes of codification of any existing section of the Redington Beach Code herein amended, words underlined represent additions to original text, words ~~stricken~~ are deletions from the original text, and words neither underlined nor stricken remain unchanged.

Section 4. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, provision or word of this Ordinance is held unconstitutional or otherwise legally invalid, same shall be severable and the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected by such invalidity, such that any remainder of the Ordinance shall withstand any severed provision, as the Board of Commissioners would have adopted the Ordinance and its regulatory scheme even absent the invalid part.

Section 5. The Codifier shall codify the substantive amendments to the Redington Beach Town Code contained in Sections 1 through 2 of this Ordinance as provided for therein, and shall not codify the exordial clauses nor any other sections not designated for codification.

Section 6. Pursuant to Florida Statutes § 166.041(4), this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption.
