COMMON NAM	DESCRIPTION AND CHARACTERISTICS
AMERICAN PLUM GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	Medium to tall tree/shrub for farmstead windbreaks, highway and riparian plantings. Adapted to a wide variety of soil types. Fair to good drough tolerance. Full sun to partial shade. Bears white flowers in spring, and yellow to red edible fruit in June-July. The fruit is used widely for making jams and jellies. The American plum is also highly important as wildlife cover and food.
BLACK CHERRY GROWTH RATE ~ FAST	The Black Cherry may grow to 60-80 feet tall by 30 feet wide (or larger) when it is found in an open field and live as long as 150 years. The fruit a reddish-black cherry, which is edible although quite acidic. This species is found on a wide variety of soils. The black cherry is one of the large cherries and, as such, its wood can be very valuable
BLACK WALNUT GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	One of the scarcest and most coveted native hardwoods, Black Walnut is used especially for furniture, gunstocks, and veneer, individual trees fetch attractive prices Fragrant leaves. Likes deep, rich, well-drained soil; grows more slowly in drier soils. Grows to 50' to 75', 60' spread. (May self-pollinate, plant two trees to ensure pollination) The delicious nuts must be gathered early, before squirrels and other wildlife can consume them.
COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	One of the most popular ornamental conifers, the Colorado blue spruce (or simply, blue spruce) is a truly magnificent sight. Grows best in full so in moist, well-drained, fertile soils. The Colorado blue spruce grows to a height of 50–75' and a spread of 10–20' at maturity. Needles are stiff, short, and silvery blue to greenish blue in color. The species has an excellent natural shape and requires little shearing.
COMMON LILAC GROWTH RATE MEDIUM	The Common Litac is noted for its showy, fragrant bloom in the late spring. Flowers come in many colors ranging from white, pink, blue, lavende to reddish-purple, clusters of flowers sit against dark green, heart shaped leaves, and the fragrance is just delightful. Grows best in well drained fertile soils, under full sunlight. Average height is 15.
EASTERN ARBORVITAE GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	a.k.a. American arborvitae - Bright emerald green year-round foliage. Its dense foliage makes an excellent hedge or privacy screen. They will grow to a mature height of 30 to 40 feet and a mature spread of 10 to 15 feet. They prefer full sun to partial shade, and can grow in a variety of soil conditions. The Eastern Arborvitae is tolerant of heat, cold, and wet sites.
EASTERN RED BUD GROWTH RATE- FAST	reddish-brown leaves changing to dark green then to yellow in fall. Forms a spreading, graceful crown Even in winter, covered with snow, the eastern redbud is sturning. Full sun or light shade. Grows to 20' in height with a 20' mature according.
FRASER FIR GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	Often referred to as the Cadillac of Christmas trees. This tree has an excellent fragrance with exceptional needle retention. Strong branches are turned slightly upward which give the tree a compact appearance and shows the silvery color. Full to partial sun. Likes cool, moist, well-drained solls. Height 30-40 ft Width 20-25 ft.
HAZEL NUT GROWTH RATE- FAST	A large fast growing shrub with showy spring flowers. The Hazel Nut can grow to 8-12' tall with a crown spreed of 10', creating a dense privacy screen, perfect for a hedgerow and as nesting sites for birds. The nuts of this American Hazel Nut have a higher nutritional value than acoms an beechnuts, making them a valuable food source for wildlife eaten by turkey, ruffed grouse, and pheasants.
H <b>YBRID POPLAR</b> GROWTH RATE – EXTREMELY FAST	Grown from rooted cuttings this extremely fast grower is widely used in the fuel, pulp and fiber industry also makes an excellent windbreak. Hybrid poplars can provide privacy and windscreens in 3 years, living borders and shade in 4 years and firewood in 5 years. Hybrid poplar trees grow used to 10 feet per year and they live 40+ years.
NORTHERN CATALPA GROWTH RATE — FAST	A medium sized shade tree with enormous leaves, very showy white and purple orchid-like flowers in early summer, long narrow bean pod- shaped fruit in fall are very ornamental. Northern Catalpa will grow to be about 55 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 30 feet. It has a high canopy with a typical clearance of 7 feet from the ground. This tree does best in full sun to partial shade. It is an amazingly adaptable plant, tolerating both dry conditions and even some standing water.
IORTHERN RED OAK GROWTH RATE FAST	It is fast growing, easy to transplant, tolerant to a varity of soil conditions. Height: 50 to 75 feet. Spread: 50 to 75 feet. The abundant acoms attractively and the leaves develop a brick-red fall color. A variety of birds depend upon Red Oak acoms, the wild turkey in particular. A Northern Red Oak may live up to 500 years.
IORWAY SPRUCE BROWTH RATE — IAST	The Norway Spruce is the most widespread, fastest growing, largest and most disease resistant spruce in the northern hemisphere. This is not a tree for a small yard! The Norway Spruce can grow 2-3+ feet per year their first 25 years under good conditions. The Norway spruce has a fiberous deep spreading root system, able to withstand winds up to 100MPH.
ED MAPLE ROWTH RATE AST	Brilliant fall coloring is one of the outstanding features of the Red Maple. This tree prefers full sun to partial shade and tolerates both extremely wet to extremely dry soils. The Red maple is prized as an ornamental shade tree because of its rapid growth, reaching heights of 40-70' tall. Leaves have a silvery underside and turn a pale yellow in the fall.
OSELOW SARGENT RABAPPLE ROWTH RATE EDIUM	*Roselow" Sargent's Crabapple is a small dense-branching crabapple that is covered with pure white fragrant blossoms in mid-May. One of the smallest crabapples, it reaches a height of only 8 feet. Full sun is ideal. Resistant to drought, soil compaction and flooding. This tree does well on a variety of soils and is an excellent planting for wildlife or windbreak.
UGAR MAPLE ROWTH RATE - EDIUM	The Sugar Maple is a landscape standout. Medium to dark-green leaves turn yellow, burnt orange or red in fall. Tolerates shade, likes a well-drained, moderately moist, fertile soil. Do not plant in confined areas or where salt is a problem. Grows to 60' to 75' with a 40'-50' spread. The sugar maple tree is the principal source of maple sugar.
HITE FLOWERING DGWOOD	The White Flowering Dogwood has an excellent show of white blossoms in spring, and bright red berries in fall and winter. It is a low branching tree that spreads horizontally and has a semi-rounded top. Does best in sun to part shade. This deciduous tree does best in well-drained acid soil. It has a mature height of 30' and a mature spread of 20'.
HITE PINE ROWTH RATE – AST	The White Pine is a large, straight-stemmed tree with a pyramidal crown. Clustered soft blue-green needles. Ideal screen or windbreak. Likes moist, well-drained soils. Grows 50' to 80' with a 20-40' spread. Mature trees can easily be 200 to 250 years old.
IST	Whitespire Birch has a nice narrow, pyramidal size and has chalky white bark that looks great all season long and because of its shape it's great along property lines. The bright green leaves rustle in the wind and turn the brightest yellow in the fell. It is heat tolerance and disease resistance. Grows well in full sun, reaching 50-60 feet when mature. It does well under a wide range of soll types.
ROWTH RATE -	Brighten up your winter landscape with bright red fruit that ripens in August and will hang on until late January. Adaptable to wet conditions and is a native in swampy areas making it an excellent shrub for moist soils in low spots or along streams and ponds. No serious insect or disease problems. Height and width 6-10' Winterberry will attract songbirds and other animals to your property, the fruit serving as an emergency food source for wild birds.

#### 2018 KENOSHA COUNTY TREES & SHRUBS





#### AMERICAN PLUM, Prunus Americana (Growth rate- medium)

This native can reach heights of 15-25' Adapted to a wide variety of soil types. Fair to good drought tolerance. Full sun to partial shade. Bears white flowers in spring, and yellow to red edible fruit in June-July. The American plum is cultivated for its edible fruit and attractive flowers, and is planted for farmstead windbreaks, wildlife plantings and crosion control because it requires no special maintenance.





#### BLACK CHERRY, Prunus verotino (Growth rate - fast)

The Black Cherry may grow to 60-80 feet tall by 30 feet wide (or larger) when it is found in an open field and live as long as 150 years. The fruit is a reddish-black cherry, which is edible although quite acidic. This species is found on a wide variety of soils. The black cherry is one of the largest chemies and, as such, its wood can be very valuable...



#### BLACK WALNUT, Castanes mollissima (Growth rate - medium)

One of the scarcest and most coveted native hardwoods, Black Walnut is used especially for furniture, guinstocks, and veneer. Individual trees fetch attractive prices Fragrant leaves. Likes deep, rich, well-drained soil; grows more slowly in drier soils. Grows to 50° to 75°, 60° spread. (May self-pollinate, plant two trees to ensure pollination) The delicious nats must be gathered early, before squirrels and other wildlife can consume them



#### COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE, Pices pungens (Growth rate slow)

Grows best in full sun, in moist, well-drained, fertile soils. Grows over 35' and needles are stiff, short, and silvery blue to greenish blue in color. Tree is conical shaped and it never requires pruning. It has striking foliage with branches in horizontal layers and needles of each new season appearing pole blue & silvery, contrasting with the darket blue-green of the older foliage. This tree requires a fairly large space for growing



#### COMMON LILAC, Springe velgeris (Growth rate medium)

The Common lilac is noted for its showy, fragrant bloom in the late spring. Flowers come in many colors ranging from white, pink, blue, lavender to reddish-purple. Grows best in well drained, fertile soils, under full sanlight. Average height is 15.





#### EASTERN ARBORVITAE, Thuja occidentialis (Growth rate - fast)

a.k.a. American arborvitae is an ornamental and timber evergreen conifer of the cypress family. Its shimmering emerald green year-round dense foliage makes the best hedge or privacy screen. They will grow to a mature height of 15 to 25 feet and a mature spread of 4 to 6 feet. They prefer full sun to partial shade, and can grow in a variety of soil conditions. This is one of the most cold-hardy trees known.



#### EASTERN RED BUD, Cercis canadensis (Growth rate-fast)

Rosy pink flowers appear in April. Reddish-purple leaves change to dark green, then to yellow. Forms a spreading, graceful crown. Full sun or light shade. Partial shade preferred in windy, dry areas. Grows to 20' to 30', 30' mature spread.



#### FRASER FIR, Abies fraseri (Growth rate = medium)

Often referred to as the Cadillac of Christmas trees. This tree has an excellent fragrance with exceptional needle retention. Strong branches are turned slightly upward which give the tree a compact appearance and shows the silvery color. Full to partial sun. Likes cool, moist, well-drained soils. Height 30-40 ft Width 20-25 ft.



#### HAZELNUT Corylus americana (Growth rate-fast)

A large fast growing shrub with showy spring flowers. The Hazel Nut can grow to 8-12' tall with a crown spread of 10', creating a dense privacy screen, perfect for a hedgerow and as nesting sites for birds. The nuts of this American Hazel Nut have a higher nutritional value than acoms and beechnuts, making them a valuable food source for wildlife eaten by turkey, ruffed grouse, and pheasants.





#### HYBRID POPLAR Populus (Growth Rate - Extremely fast)

Grown from rooted cuttings this extremely fast grower is widely used in the fuel, pulp and fiber industry also makes an excellent windbreak. Hybrid Poplars can provide privacy and windscreens in 3 years, living borders and shade in 4 years and firewood in 5 years. Hybrid poplar trees grow up to 10 feet per year and they live 40+ years.



#### NORTHERN CATALPA, Comus sericea (Growth rate- fast)

A medium sized shade tree with enormous leaves, very showy white and purple orchidlike flowers in early summer, long narrow bean pod-shaped fruit in fall are very ornamental. Northern Catalpa will grow to be about 55 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 30 feet. It has a high canopy with a typical clearance of 7 feet from the ground. This tree does best in full sun to partial shade. It is an amazingly adaptable plant, tolerating both dry conditions and even some standing water.



#### NORTHERN RED OAK, Quercus rubra (Growth rate-medium)

This oak tree thrives in rich, well-drained soils and is commonly found throughout Wisconsin. The Red Oak can reach heights of 60 to 75 ft in full or partial sun. Fall brings a display of russet-red colors. The acorns of the red oak, larger than those of any other oak, are very bitter but savored by wildlife. The wood of the red oak group has similar properties to that of white oaks but is much more porous and less resistant to decay. It is used for general construction, railroad ties, furniture, interior finish, and flooring.



#### NORWAY SPRUCE (Growth rate - fast)

The Norway Spruce is the most widespread, fastest growing, largest and most disease resistant spruce in the northern hemisphere. This is not a tree for a small yard! The Norway Spruce can grow 2-3+ feet per year their first 25 years under good conditions. The Norway spruce has a fiberous deep spreading root system that makes this tree very wind stable, able withstand winds up to 100MPH.



#### RED MAPLE, Acer rubrum (Growth rate- fast)

Brilliant fall coloring is one of the outstanding features of the Red Maple. This tree prefers full sun to partial shade and tolerates both extremely wet to extremely dry soils. The Red maple is prized as an ornamental shade tree because of its rapid growth, reaching heights of 40-70' tall. Leaves have a silvery underside and turn a pale yellow in the fall.



#### ROSELOW SARGENT CRABAPPLE, (Growth rate -mcdium)

'Roselow' Sargent's Crabapple is a small dense-branching crabapple that is covered with pure white fragrant blossoms in mid-May. One of the smallest crabapples, it reaches a height of only 8 feet. Full sun is ideal. Resistant to drought, soil compaction and flooding. This tree does well on a variety of soils and is an excellent planting for wildlife or windbreak.



#### SUGAR MAPLE, Acer saccarum (Growth rate- medium)

Wisconsin's State Tree is the Sugar Maple. Sugar Maple is a favorite shade tree with reliable fall color. Found in the open, Sugar Maple may easily grow to 80 ft tall by 40 ft wide. Sugar Maple thrives when it is planted into rich, moderately deep soils having even moisture coupled with good drainage. Has brilliant red, orange, and yellow fall color.



### WHITE FLOWERING DOGWOOD, Metasequoia glyptostroboides (Growth rate-Medium)

The White Flowering Dogwood has an excellent show of white blossoms in spring, and bright red berries in fall and winter. It is a low branching tree that spreads horizontally and has a semi-rounded top. Does best in sun to part shade. This deciduous tree does best in well-drained acid soil. It has a mature height of 30' and a mature spread of 20'.



#### WHITE PINE, Pinus strobes (Growth rate-fast)

The White Pine is a hardy, valuable tree. This pine is distinguished from all other pines by the fact that its soft bluish-green needles occur in bundles of five. Because of its vigorous rate of growth and high-quality wood, white pine is a leader in the lumber market. White pine prefers a sunny location and tolerates most moist, well-drained soils. This tree grows 50' to 80' with a 20-40' spread. Ideal screen or windbreak species.



#### WHITESPIRE BIRCH, Betula populifolia (Growth rate-medium)

a.k.a. Gray Birch reaches 20 to 40'. Leaves turn a lovely yellow color in autumn before dropping. For the first four or five years, the bark is dark brown but later takes on a smooth, chalky-white appearance but does not peel as readily as the bark of white birches. The White Spire Birch is heat tolerance and disease resistance. Grows well in full sun and under a wide range of soil types.



#### WINTERBERRY, Rosa rugosa (Growth rate- medium)

Brighten up your winter landscape with bright red fruit that ripens in August and will hang on until late January. Adaptable to wet conditions and is a native in swampy areas making it an excellent shrub for moist soils in low spots or along streams and ponds. No serious insect or disease problems. Height and width 6-10' Winterberry will attract songbirds and other animals to your property, the fruit serving as an emergency food source for wild birds.



#### WATER GEL, I bag will treat about 100 trees

#### **VILLAGE ORDINANCE**

# SEC. 8-3-6 GARBAGE COLLECTION SCHEDULES

—Residents shall not place the carts or any bulk material on the curb before 4:00 p.m. of the afternoon prior to the scheduled collection day. Empty containers shall be removed from the curb by 8:00 p.m. of the same day.

#### (A) Schedule.

- (1) The contractor will furnish regularly scheduled collection from every residential unit [four (4) units or less] in the Village of Bristol, according to a regular schedule approved by the Director of Public Works.
  - (2) Refuse collection shall be scheduled weekly.
  - (3) Recyclables collection shall be scheduled bi-weekly.
  - (4) Bulky collection shall be scheduled monthly.

#### (B) Placement; Collection Carts.

- (1) Residents shall place their material suitable for refuse or recyclable collection at the curb or alley of their homes or at such other location designated by the contractor for the day scheduled for collection.
- (2) Residents shall use collection carts provided by the contractor for the disposal of recyclables and refuse.
- (3) All refuse and recyclables carts shall be placed by the customer at the curb, alley or other site agreed upon by the customer and the contractor by 6:00 a.m. of the day of collection. Residents shall not place the carts or any bulk material on the curb before 4:00 p.m. of the afternoon prior to the scheduled collection day. Empty containers shall be removed from the curb by 8:00 p.m. of the same day.

#### (C) Cost of Collection Carts.

- (1) The contractor shall, at its expense, supply and furnish carts for the collection of refuse and recyclables to all residential units. The contractor shall provide and apply the manufacturer's warranty for defects in the carts, including broken wheels or lids from regular usage.
- (2) The contractor is not responsible for damage from negligent use, such as the cart being cut or damaged by a tool or saw, burned by hot ashes, being hit by a vehicle, etc. The contractor is also not responsible for missing or stolen carts.

Second installment and/or late payments must be paid to the KENOSHA COUNTY TREASURER, 1010-56<sup>th</sup> St, Kenosha, WI 53140, on or before July 31, 2018.

The Bristol Village Office CANNOT accept Real Estate Tax payments after January 31, 2018.

If scheduled tax payments have not been received by **January 31, 2018**, taxes become delinquent and bear interest at a rate of 1 ½ % per month beginning **February 1, 2018** on the **FULL** tax amount.

Lottery Credit: The lottery credit will be applied to this year's real estate tax bill if this was your primary residence as of January 1, 2017. The credit will appear on your 2017 tax bill. #### **Annual Burn Permits**

#### **Bristol Recycling Center**

The Bristol Recycling Center is still open for brush, leaves, waste oil, anti-freeze, and scrap steel. The gates will be open Monday-Friday 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., also December - March on the 1<sup>st</sup> Saturday of the month from 9:00 a.m. to noon, April - November on the 1<sup>st</sup> & 3rd Wednesday of the month from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., and the 1<sup>st</sup> & 3rd Saturday of the month from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

#### **All Dog Owners**

All Bristol residents who own, harbor or keep a dog more than five months of age shall annually or within 30 days from the date such dog becomes five months of age, pay the dog license fee of \$5.00 for neutered males and spayed females or \$11.00 for intact males and females. An additional \$5.00 late fee will be charged after March 31st of each year as required by Wisconsin Statute 174.05(5). 2018 dog licenses are now available from the Bristol Village Office during regular working hours. Proof of current rabies vaccination is required before a license will be issued. Residents who hold kennel licenses MUST schedule a kennel inspection to renew your license. Residents with four (4) or more dogs must be approved by the Village to obtain a kennel license. Payments may be mailed to:

This notice is a reminder to any property owners that have a navigable waterway (creek, ditch, cannel, river, pond, lake), on their property. It is a great time of year (because of easier access with the

leaves off the underbrush) to take a look and remove any fallen trees or brush that may have fallen over the years.

Please remove the fallen debris as far as possible from the stream so it does not float back into the stream and cause further problems.

This past summer's flood was a reminder that when these fallen obstructions stop the flow of water it has far reaching consequences. If you see a beaver dam feel free to call one of the trappers listed below. It is currently trapping season. It is best to remove the beavers before you remove the dam because they will rebuild the dam very quickly.

It is the property owner's responsibility to keep obstructions from causing problems upstream. If you have any questions please call 262-857-2368.


