



Tree Order Deadline is February 28, 2014

Attached in this newsletter are the tree order forms and their descriptions from Kenosha and Racine County. The two best times to plant trees are 20 years ago and today.

Trees can add value to your home, help cool your home and neighborhood, break the cold winds to lower your heating costs, and provide food for wildlife.

This drawing demonstrates effective planting, placing the right tree in the right place. Trees properly placed can lower line clearance costs for utility companies, reduce tree mortality, and result in healthier community forests.

If you are planting near wires choose trees or shrubs that will not grow within 10 ft of any wire. Ask yourself: "If I plant this at this location, what will be affected?" Road Right of Ways are usually 66 ft. which would locate your property line at approximately 33 ft. from the center line of the road. If you would like to plant near the right-of-way, please call the Village Hall for more information.

COMMON NAME	DESCRIPTION AND CHARACTERISTICS
BLACK CHERRY GROWTH RATE FAST	The Black Cherry may grow to 60-80 feet tall by 30 feet wide (or larger) when it is found in an open field and live as long as 150 years. The fruit is a reddish-black cherry, which is edible although quite acidic. This species is found on a wide variety of soils. The black cherry is one of the largest cherries and, as such, its wood can be very valuable.
BLACK HILLS SPRUCE GROWTH RATE - SLOW	Black Hills Spruce can reach a height of six feet within nine years and is very long-lived. That slow growth results in dense growth, making it perfect for privacy screens and windbreaks. It prefers rich, moist soil and full sun but will also thrives in dry, well-drained locations. You won't have to fuss over it to enjoy a pleasing shape as it requires little or no pruning. Black Hills Spruce is virtually immune to the most common spruce pests and deer generally will even leave it alone.
COMMON LILAC GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	The Common lilac is noted for its showy, fragrant bloom in the late spring. Flowers come in many colors ranging from white, pink, blue, lavender to reddish-purple. Grows best in well drained, fertile soils, under full sunlight. Average height is 15'.
	a.k.a. American arborvitae Bright emerald green year-round foliage. Its dense foliage makes an excellent hedge or privacy screen. They will grow to a mature height of 30 to 40 feet and a mature spread of 10 to 15 feet. They prefer full sun to partial shade, and can grow in a variety of soil conditions. The Eastern Arborvitae is tolerant of heat, cold, and wet sites.
EASTERN RED BUD GROWTH RATE- FAST	Spectacular rosy pink blossoms that appear in April, ussually one of the first trees to welcome the spring. Great colorful foliage year round with reddish-brown leaves changing to dark green then to yellow in fall. Forms a spreading, graceful crown. Full sun or light shade. Grows to 20' to 30'in height with a 25' mature spread.
FORSYTHIA GROWTH RATE- FAST	a.k.a. Lynwood. Gold Sunny splashes of bright yellow flowers are forsythia's calling card, announcing the return of spring. The blooms are slightly bell-shape and range from butter yellow to gold. Forsythia is excellent for hedging, fast growing and tolerant of moist soils. Grows 6 to 8 feet tall and wide and does best in sun to light shade. Fall color is purple.
FRASER FIR GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	Often referred to as the cadillac of Christmas trees. Its fragrance, shape, strong limbs, and ability to retain its soft needles for a long time when cut (which do not prick easily when hanging ornaments) make it one of the best trees for this purpose. Full to partial sun. Likes cool, moist, well-drained soils.
HAZEL NUT GROWTH RATE- FAST	A large fast growing shrub with showy spring flowers. The Hazel Nut can grow to 8-12' tall with a crown spread of 10', creating a dense privacy screen, perfect for a hedgerow and as nesting sites for birds. The nuts of this American Hazel Nut have a higher nutritional value than acorns and beechnuts, making them a valuable food source for wildlife eaten by turkey, ruffed grouse, and pheasants.
HIGHBUSH CRANBERRY GROWTH RATE- FAST	a.k.a. American Cranberry - grows to 15' and rounded in shape. They make a great hedge or privacy screen Flowers are very small, white, similar to other ornamental Viburnums. Yellow to red-purple fall color. The fruit is showy red and very persistent, remaining on the bushes well after frost and brightening the winter landscape. Use fruits in jelly, preserves or sauces. This shrub has very few insect problems and prefers good, well-drained soil.
HYBRID POPLAR GROWTH RATE - EXTREMELY FAST	Grown from rooted cuttings this extremely fast grower is widely used in the fuel, pulp and fiber industry also makes an excellent windbreak. Hybrid Poplars can provide privacy and windscreens in 3 years, living borders and shade in 4 years and firewood in 5 years. Hybrid poplar trees grow up to 10 feet per year and they live 40+ years.
NORTHERN BAYBERRY GROWTH RATE - SLOW	The Northern Bayberry is generally described as a Perennial Tree or Shrub. The Bayberry has green foliage and yellow flowers, with blue fruits. The typical Northern Bayberry can reach up to 12 feet high. It has high tolerance to drought conditions. The highly scented fruit of bayberry was a source of wax for early settlers in America. This scent is still used in candle making.
NORTHERN RED OAK GROWTH RATE – FAST	It is fast growing, easy to transplant, tolerant to a varity of soil conditions. Height: 50 to 75 feet. Spread: 50 to 75 feet. The abundant acorns attract wildlife, and the leaves develop a brick-red fall color. A variety of birds depend upon Red Oak acorns, the wild turkey in particular.
NORWAY SPRUCE GROWTH RATE - FAST	The Norway Spruce is the most widespread, fastest growing, largest and most disease resistant spruce in the northern hemisphere. This is not a tree for a small yard! The Norway Spruce can grow 2-3+ feet per year their first 25 years under good conditions. The Norway spruce has a fiberous deep spreading root system that makes this tree very wind stable, able withstand winds up to 100MPH.
RED MAPLE GROWTH RATE – FAST	Brilliant fall coloring is one of the outstanding features of the Red Maple. This tree prefers full sun to partial shade and tolerates both extremely wet to extremely dry soils. The Red maple is prized as an ornamental shade tree because of its rapid growth, reaching heights of 40-70' tall. Leaves have a silvery underside and turn a pale yellow in the fall.
RED OSIER DOGWOOD GROWTH RATE- FAST	This is an attractive plant year round. In the winter it is known for its flaming red bark and in the spring and summer for it's light foliage that flickers in the wind. Fall foliage is golden to reddish on red stems. The small flowers are in large clusters of frothy white. The berries are pale with a touch of blue. Grows best in moist to wet soils with full sunlight. Average height is 8' and it spreads outward to 6'.
RUGOSA ROSE GROWTH RATE - FAST	The Rugosa Rose is a shrub mainly used as a hedge that has beautiful pink flowers that continually bloom from June through August and are 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 inches in size. It develops 1 inch red berries in August which last through the winter to provide food for wildlife. Grows to a height of 6' high and 6' wide.
SARGENT CRABAPPLE GROWTH RATE - MEDIUM	'Roselow' Sargent's Crabapple is a small dense-branching crabapple that is covered with pure white fragrant blossoms in mid-May. One of the smallest crabapples, it reaches a height of only 8 feet. Full sun is ideal. Resistant to drought, soil compaction and flooding. This tree does well on a variety of soils and is an excellent planting for wildlife or windbreak.
SHADBLOW SERVICEBERRY GROWTH RATE - FAST	One of the first trees to bloom in early spring, these trees are covered with billowy masses of small white flowers. Berry-like fruits are produced in summer and are edible if the birds don't get them first. Serviceberry got it's name from the custom in days gone by of cutting the branches in winter and forcing them into bloom for Sunday church services. Height: 25-30 feet. Sun to partial shade.
SUGAR MAPLE GROWTH RATE – MEDIUM	The Sugar Maple is a landscape standout. Medium to dark-green leaves turn yellow, burnt orange or red in fall. Tolerates shade, likes a well-drained, moderately moist, fertile soil. Do not plant in confined areas or where salt is a problem. Grows to 60' to 75', 40'-50' spread The sugar maple tree is the principal source of maple sugar.
TULIP TREE GROWTH RATE FAST	A fast-growing tree with bright green leaves that resemble tulip flowers in profile and turn golden yellow in fall. Greenish-yellow flowers are carried high in the tree. Stems are aromatic. Oval in shape, grows well in various soils, likes full sun. Grows to 70' to 90', 40' spread.
WHITE PINE GROWTH RATE - FAST	The White Pine is a large, straight-stemmed tree with a pyramidal crown. Clustered soft blue-green needles. Ideal screen or windbreak. Likes moist, well-drained soils. Grows 50' to 80' with a 20-40' spread .Mature trees can easily be 200 to 250 years old.
WHITESPIRE BIRCH GROWTH RATE - FAST	Whitespire Birch has a nice narrow, pyramidal size and has chalky white bark that looks great all season long, because of its shape it's great along property lines. The bright green leaves rustle in the wind and turn the brightest yellow in the fall. It is heat tolerance and disease resistance. Grows well in full sun, reaching 50-60 feet when mature. It does well under a wide range of soil types.

Plan your trick or treat route

Map out a trick or treating track choosing residential areas that are safe and well lit. Keep to pavements and find the safest places to cross the road.

Set off early for trick or treating

Trick or treating is from 4pm-7pm

Be safe and seen in the dark

Add reflective accessories to bikes and outfits to help children stand out after dark.

Cycling at night? Use lights

If children are cycling at night the law says that bikes must be fitted with clean, working lights - white at the front and red at the back - and a rear reflector.

Take a flashlight

Stick the flashlight in a lantern or inside a pumpkin head for maximum creepiness combined with visibility.

Children need an adult with them

Make sure all children know not to go off on a solo mission. Let them know they must always stay with friends and accompanying adult.

- When snow blowing or shoveling your driveway, try to move the snow to the right of your driveway as you are looking at the street. If you put it on the left, side the snow plow may carry it back into the front of your driveway. This will not eliminate the snow but should reduce the amount that ends up at the end of your driveway. It also violates town ordinance to plow or blow snow into the road. Any snow put into the road may cause the resident or business to be ticketed.
- Snow and ice control of sidewalks and driveways is required of the property owner.
- Piling of snow in front of fire hydrants or sprinkler connections is illegal.

With winter coming soon, snow issues become more prevalent. Please help out by keeping fire hydrants clear of snow if they are near your residence or business.

Daylights Savings—"Fall Back"

Daylight saving time will end at 2 a.m. on Nov. 3, allowing you to gain back that hour of sleep (for at least one night). Most people will turn their clocks back before going to bed Saturday.

Doctors recommend that you modify your schedule early - at least a week before the time change. Other tips include keeping well hydrated, staying active during the day and adjusting your medication schedule. Doing all of these things a few days before the time change helps your body to adjust.
