If you are planting near wires choose trees or shrubs that will not grow within 10 ft of any wire. Ask yourself, "If I plant this at this location, what will be affected?" Road Right -of- Ways are usually 66 ft. which would locate your property line at approximately 33 ft. from the center line of the road. If you would like to plant near the right-of-way, please call the Village Hall for more information.


The Village was awarded Tree City USA at the April 28th, 2014 Village Board meeting.

The Arbor Day Foundation encourages thoughtful practices that help preserve community trees while also serving a utility company's customers.

This drawing demonstrates effective planting, placing the right tree in the right place. Trees properly placed can lower line clearance costs for utility companies, reduce tree mortality, and result in healthier community forests.



Trees can add value to your home, help cool your home and neighborhood, break the cold winds to lower your heating costs, and provide food for wildlife.

Tall trees surrounding your home, such as Maple, Oak, Pine and Spruce, provide summer shade to lower cooling costs and keep out cold winter winds.

Village of Bristol Arbor Day Celebration

To promote Arbor Day the Village of Bristol is distributing a Sugar Maple *Acer saccarum* (Wisconsin State Tree) seedling to all Bristol Grade School students to celebrate Arbor Day 2014. The Village wants to support tree planting in the community because:

- Trees support property values
- Give birds and animals places to live
- Support healthy living by acting as filters for clean air we breathe
- Maples have brilliant red, orange and yellow color in the fall
- Can reduce cooling costs in the summer if planted on the southern exposure to your house
- Protect people and pets from the hot sun in the summer
- Can reduce winter winds which would reduce winter heating cost (Coniferous trees)

Since the Sugar Maple can grow to be 80 ft tall and 40 ft wide don't plant it near overhead utility lines or too close to buildings. On the back of this sheet is a handout in regards to planting the right tree in the right spot. Sugar Maples thrive when planted in rich, moderately deep soils having even moisture coupled with good drainage.

The Village would like to encourage streets that are lined with trees. New subdivisions are required to plant street trees. In more rural areas the Village would ask that you think about planting trees near the Right of way (R/W) of the streets. The Right of Ways is usually about 33 ft from the center line of the road. Planting the trees on the house side of the ditch would facilitate the treed streets we are looking for and minimize the disturbance to the trees. Keep in mind if the tree is in the R/W and the Village Public Works needs to repair the ditch or a utility needs to be dug up to be fixed the tree may be affected. Notice is hereby given to each and every person who owns, occupies or controls land in the Village of Bristol, to cut and destroy any noxious weeds, which include Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Marijuana, or Hemp. Field Bindweed, commonly known as Creeping Jenny, Musk Thistle (Carduus Nutans L), Goatsbeard, Quack or Quitch Grass, Harmful Barberry and English Charlock, Wild Mustard, Purple Loosestrife Rose. This must be done at such a time and in such a matter as shall eventually prevent them from bearing seed, or spreading to adjoining property, as required by Section 66.0407 of Wisconsin Statues. Thistles must be cut before they reach seed stage.
