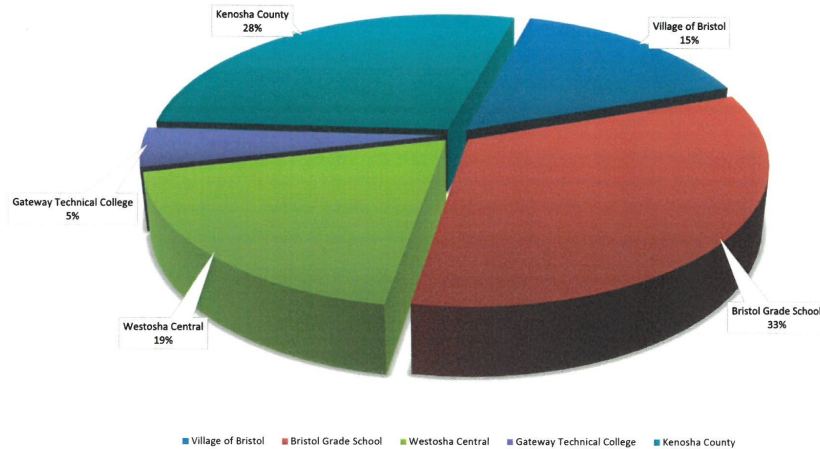

The Village Board approved the 2020 budget on November 18, 2019. The Levy was increased by .54%. This increase was the amount allowed from new construction only (new homes and additions.) The revaluation that happened in 2019 showed that the average assessed value went up about 17%. That allowed the mill rate to go down by 17%. Page 6 shows how a home valued at 168,000 in the 2019 assessment went up to 202,800 in 2020 and that the taxes would stay the same for the village portion of \$537.

Page 3 shows a pie chart and how your tax bill gets divided between districts. We chose the Bristol school district to show because that is the majority of the tax base. There would be similar charts for those properties in Paris and Salem school districts also. The Village receives the second lowest amount of the taxes next to Gateway Technical College. The amount of taxes that the Village has collected (outside of new construction) has not changed since the levy limits were enacted in 2005.

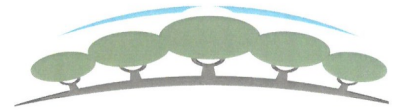

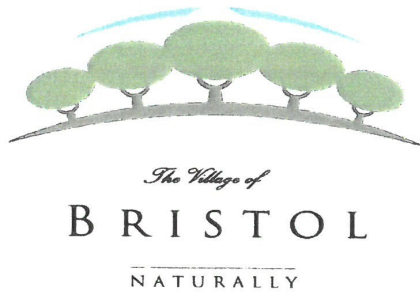

Dear Residents,

This letter is a reminder to any property owners that have a navigable waterway (creek, ditch, canal, river, pond, lake), on their property. It is a great time of year (because of easier access with the leaves off the underbrush) to take a look and remove any fallen trees or brush that may have fallen over the years. Please remove the fallen debris as far as possible from the stream so it does not float back into the stream and cause further problems. Past flooding problems are a reminder that when these fallen obstructions stop the flow of water it has far reaching consequences. If you see a beaver dam feel free to call one of the trappers listed below. It is currently trapping season. It is best to remove the beavers before you remove the dam because they will rebuild the dam very quickly. It is the property owner's responsibility to keep obstructions from causing problems upstream. If you have any questions please call 262-857-2368.

# VOTER REGISTRATION

*Information provided by the Wisconsin Elections Commission*

## WHEN CAN I REGISTER TO VOTE?

**By mail.** Up to 20 days before the election. Registration forms should be mailed to your municipal clerk. You can start your voter registration form online at <http://myvote.wi.gov>. Your form must be printed, signed, and mailed or delivered, to your municipal clerk. You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering. If you are registering by mail, you can use any of the forms of Proof of Residence except a residential lease.

**Online.** Up to 20 days before the election. Voters who have a valid State of Wisconsin Driver License or State of Wisconsin ID card issued by the Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) can register to vote online on the **MyVote Wisconsin** website: <http://myvote.wi.gov>. To register online, the voter must enter a name, date of birth, Driver License or ID number, and an address that matches what is on file with the Wisconsin DMV. If all of the fields match, the voter will be able to register to vote completely online without needing to print, sign or mail the form and without needing to send a proof of residence document. Voters who are not able to match their information with the information in the DMV database will be given the option to register by mail (see instructions above).

**In the municipal clerk's office.** You may register in-person in your municipal clerk's office up until the Friday before the election at 5:00 p.m. or close of business, whichever is later. You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote.

**At the polling place on Election Day.** You may register at the polls on Election Day. You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote.

## WHAT DO I NEED TO BRING TO REGISTER TO VOTE?

**If you have been issued a State of Wisconsin Driver License or ID card that is current and valid, you must provide the number and expiration date.** If your WI driver license is cancelled or expired; or your WI DOT-issued ID is expired, provide the number and the last four digits of your Social Security number. If you have not been issued a WI driver license or WI DOT-issued ID, you must provide the last four digits of your Social Security number. If you have none of these documents, you will be able to indicate that fact.

**You must provide a Proof of Residence document** when registering to vote in Wisconsin. A Proof of Residence document is a document that proves where you live in Wisconsin. Please see the Proof of Residence handout for a list of acceptable documents.

## IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE I NEED TO KNOW ABOUT REGISTRATION?

**Photo ID is never required when registering to vote.** However, a Proof of Residence document is always needed when registering to vote in Wisconsin.

**Voters must reside at their address for at least 10 days by Election Day** in order to register to vote. Voters who have moved within Wisconsin less than 10 days before the election must vote from their previous address, either by absentee ballot or at the polling place. Voters who have moved to Wisconsin from another state less than 10 days before an election are only eligible to vote in Presidential elections.

**Wisconsin law no longer allows a "corroborating witness"** to provide Proof of Residence. See the "Proof of Residence" documents for a list of Proof of Residence documents.

You cannot register the Saturday, Sunday, or Monday before an election, but **you can register at the polling place on Election Day.**

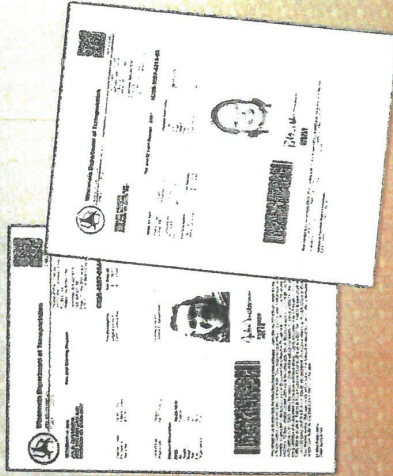

# WHY E-CYCLE?

YOU'LL FIND THE ANSWER BEHIND THE SCREENS, BUTTONS  
AND ENCLOSING CASES OF YOUR OLD ELECTRONIC DEVICES.

## Electronics are complex, made up of small amounts of many valuable materials.

Here are some of the recyclable  
materials found in electronic devices:

### PLASTIC

Almost all electronics are surrounded by **PLASTIC** that can be melted down to make new electronics, saving landfill space, oil and energy.

### STEEL

**STEEL** is used as the framework for many electronics. It is also the most used metal in the world. Your old computer, if recycled, may one day be part of a bridge, car, or skyscraper.

### ALUMINUM

**ALUMINUM** keeps your electronics light and easy to carry around. It is used to make airplanes and helps cars be more fuel efficient. It is one of the most recyclable materials.

### PRECIOUS METALS

Circuit boards, the "brains" of almost all electronics, contain **PRECIOUS METALS** all melted together. These metals, like **GOLD, SILVER AND PLATINUM**, can be separated and reused through high-tech recycling.

### LEAD

**LEAD** is found in old-style monitors and tube TVs, solder and circuit boards. Lead is toxic and can cause significant health problems if not carefully handled. When properly recycled, lead finds new life in car batteries and other materials.

### MERCURY

There are small amounts of **MERCURY** in the lamps and circuit boards of electronics. Mercury can be reused through high-tech recycling, preventing it from getting into our air and water.

### **Why is it important to recycle electronics?**

Electronics contain valuable, reusable materials like aluminum, copper, precious metals, plastic and steel. They also contain harmful materials like lead, mercury, chemical flame retardants and batteries. Recycling and reusing electronics protects the environment, conserves valuable raw materials and preserves landfill space.

### **What happens when I recycle my electronics?**

Electronics recyclers break down your electronics, reuse or recycle safe materials, and properly manage hazardous materials. Recyclers must comply with state and federal regulations to ensure environmental and worker safety.

### **Where can I e-cycle?**

Some collectors accept electronics for free, while others charge a fee for items like TVs. Call ahead or visit a collector's website to learn about costs and restrictions. If you don't see a site near you, consider manufacturer mail-back programs.

The following items CANNOT be put in the trash or sent to landfills or incinerators:



- Computers (desktops, laptops and tablets)
- Computer monitors (includes e-readers and similar devices with screens of at least 7")
- Computer accessories (mice, keyboards, external hard drives, etc.)
- TVs
- Cellphones
- DVD players, VCRs and DVRs
- Desktop printers (including those that scan, fax and/or copy and 3-D printers)
- Fax machines

The above items and other electronics can be RECYCLED throughout the state.

### BURN PERMITS (*payments not available online*)

Outdoor fires require a burn permit which is valid January-December. Please call the Fire Department Burn Line at [857-4063](tel:857-4063) for the current burn status just prior to burning. Permits can be purchased at the Village Hall during regular business hours or at the Fire Department nights and weekends. First time permits are \$25, and renewals are \$15.

### BUILDING PERMITS

If you are doing any type of home renovations please visit our website and complete a [building permit application](#). A [zoning permit](#) is also required in addition to the building permit if you are building a garage, shed, fence, accessory building, or adding on to a building.

### CREDIT CARD PAYMENTS at the Village Office

The Village of Bristol is now accepting credit card payments [in the village office](#) for anything payable to the village. There is a convenience fee of 3%.

### ONLINE PAYMENTS NOW AVAILABLE!

Payments can now be made online for: sewer/water bills, taxes, invoices payable to the village, traffic citations, and building permits. There is a 2.75% convenience fee if paying with a debit or credit card, or a \$1 fee if paying by e-check. Visit our website to make your payments.
