


From the President

- Welcoming five new Trustees to the Board;





The Friends of the Millbrook Library



Youth Services

The Youth Services department strives to promote literacy and learning by offering materials and programming to children, teens and families. Storytimes for toddlers and preschoolers, Book Bunch, and Lego afternoons are a few of our weekly and monthly programming series that promote a love of reading and learning. In addition to our various ongoing programming series, we provided fun and educational programming for families during winter and spring breaks. Our busy Summer Reading Program promoted STEAM programming and experienced our biggest crowds yet for the Wednesday night family program series this past summer. Programming for teens is a focus for our staff as well. We offered teens our monthly Teen Café and Minecraft programs, as well as Digital Animation workshops and twice a year Babysitter Training classes.

In 2016, we were fortunate to be able to expand the early literacy space in the Children's Room and purchase more educational and early literacy material through a generous grant from the Vincent and Carol Dean Family Charitable Foundation. To further encourage early literacy activities, we started a "Play Space" program twice a week where children and parents can come together, play and talk. This allows children to play together, and families to meet and develop friendships.



We are pleased to announce that the Pace Land Use Law Center's award winning Land Use Leadership Alliance Training Program will be held again this fall in your region. The program is offered FREE OF CHARGE and satisfies the four credit annual training requirement for local board members. The program will focus on fair and affordable housing and will be conducted by the Land Use Law Center of Pace University and the Housing Action Council. The program comprises three sessions held on October 13, October 27 and November 10. The sessions will include special presentations and discussions. In addition, participants will take a half-day bus tour to fair and affordable housing sites across Westchester County on November 10th. All sessions will take place on the Pace Law School campus in White Plains.

The Land Use Leadership Alliance (LULA) training program has graduated over 3,000 leaders and garnered over 100 formal resolutions of support from local governments and other entities. Since 1995, the program has helped local leaders become more effectively involved in their community's land use decision-making process. The training program does not recommend any particular strategies, but instead teaches what has worked in other communities and how to identify and implement land use options that are responsive to current conditions.

Attached is a flyer including details on how to sign-up. Please pass this along to your staff members, town/village board members, planning board members, local housing committees members, economic development departments, not-for-profits, local developers, or citizens actively engaged in the conversation. Applications must be received by September 29th. While you are not charged for the program, the direct costs exceed \$1,000 per participant, so it is critical that we accept only candidates who agree to attend every session.

SMALL QUANTITY GENERATOR CERTIFICATION

I hereby certify that I am a generator of hazardous waste within the State of New York and that because of the small volume of hazardous waste generated and/or stored, I qualify for conditionally exempt small quantity generator status.

I understand that in order for conditionally exempt small quantity generator status, I must meet <u>all three</u> of the following conditions:

- 1. Generate less than 1 kg/month (2.2 pounds) of acute hazardous waste (as defined by 6 NYCRR Part 371), and never store more than this amount on site at any time; and
- 2. Generate less than 100 kg/month (220 pounds) of all other hazardous waste (as defined by 6 NYCRR Part 371), and never store more 1,000 kg/month on site at any time.
- 3. Transport a maximum of 220 lbs of hazardous waste at one time.

I further understand that if, in the future, I exceed the quantity limitations described above, I will become subject to additional regulation as a hazardous waste generator and will no longer be eligible to participate in this type of collection program.

I certify that I have the authority to make these statements on behalf of my school, government agency or business. Also, I, the undersigned, do hereby certify that the items brought for collection came from my school, government agency or business located in Dutchess County.
