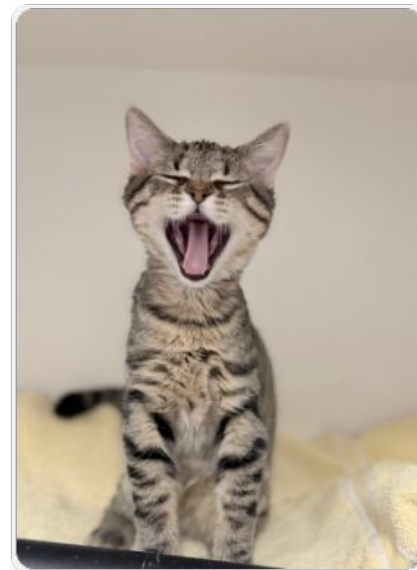

West Bountiful vs. County Service Distribution

Minimal Footprint, Direct Access

West Bountiful represents ~2.5% of overall Davis County service volume, benefiting directly from dedicated county field enforcement, 24/7 dispatch, and full shelter access.

Park Signage Recommendations

While in the area doing Park Patrols, there were areas where we believe signage could be implemented, or improved:

- **Charnell Pocket Park:** Has no signage. We recommend placing a leash law and pet waste sign here.
- **Mill Creek Trailhead:** There is currently no signage at this trailhead regarding pet rules or leash requirements.
- **Legacy Nature Preserve:** There is no signage here indicating if dogs are allowed or if leash rules apply.

*West Bountiful City Park has signs at both parking lots and 4 pet waste stations, which serves as a great standard for these other locations.

RE: Planning Commission Recommendation - Height Regulations in Residential Zones

This memo introduces proposed code amendments as recommended by the planning commission related to height regulations in the A-1 and other residential districts.

Background

After reviewing a separate application related to height limitations in this zone, the city council requested that the planning commission make recommendations on the following sections of code:

- **Heights Allowances with Setbacks:** WBMC 17.16.060 regulates the maximum height for main and accessory structures in the A-1 district. Structures have a standard maximum of 35' with allowances of up to an additional 5' depending on the side setbacks. The exception allowing the additional 5' was enacted in 2014.
- **Height Exceptions:** Additionally, WBMC 17.16.060.D (and similar sections in other zones), list broad exceptions to height limitations, with no maximum height set.

Planning Commission Recommendations

The planning commission held several discussions, concluding with a public hearing. Following the public hearing, they made the following recommendations.

Heights Allowances with Setbacks

The planning commission focused on the setbacks of main structures, and did not make a recommendation on accessory structures. Commissioners stated that additional side yard setbacks could help address privacy concerns associated with taller homes while still maintaining the property owner's ability to construct a taller structure on large lots. The proposal is as follows:

17.16.060

1. The height of a main structure, except for non-commercial structures, may be increased to a maximum of forty (40) feet if the structure is set back as shown in the chart below.

Height		Minimum Side Setback	Combined Side Setback
	≤35 ft	10 ft	24 ft
>35 ft	≤36 ft	13 ft	26 ft
>36 ft	≤37 ft	16 ft	32 ft
>37 ft	≤38 ft	19 ft	38 ft
>38 ft	≤39 ft	22 ft	44 ft
>39 ft	≤40 ft	25 ft	50 ft

With this recommendation in hand, the council may want to consider:

1. Should main structure heights ever exceed 35' (the limit in other residential zones)?
2. Are these additional setbacks sufficient to exceed 35'?
3. Should accessory structures be added to the discussion of additional height requirements?

Height Exceptions

Under the planning commission's recommendation, height exceptions in all residential zones would be limited to a maximum of 5 feet above the applicable maximum structure height. Additionally, the types of structures or features eligible for a height exception would be limited to those that are residential in nature. The proposed language for each residential zones is as follows:

D. Exceptions to height limitations. Roof structures for the housing of elevators, flagpoles, chimneys, wireless or television masts or similar structures may be erected above the height limits herein prescribed, but shall not exceed the height of forty-five (45) feet* and no space above the main structure height limit shall be allowed for the purposes of providing additional floor space, and such increased height to all other provisions of the municipal code.

* 40' in the R-1-10 and R-1-22 zones.

Council Action

As a legislative proposal, the council has the discretion to approve, modify, or deny the proposed code change. Appropriate direction at this time may include:

1. Direct staff to bring back an ordinance adopting the changes as proposed.
2. Direct staff to bring back an ordinance adopting a modified version of the proposed changes.
3. Take no action on the recommendation.

Work Session: Detached Accessory Dwelling Units

Mayor Romney welcomed the city council and planning commission to the joint session. Duane briefly reviewed the requirement to have an ordinance for Detached Accessory Dwelling Units (DADUs) by Oct. 1.

The group reviewed the draft regulations contemplated by the Planning Commission regarding minimum lot size, parking requirements, maximum and minimum unit size, setbacks, building height, lot coverage, the number of ADUs allowed, owner-occupancy requirements, and short-term rentals.

The group specifically discussed setback requirements. Commissioner Sweat and Mitchell both expressed their opinion that DADU should share the same setbacks as a primary dwelling.

Duane then presented possible options for setbacks for consideration by the group. Council member Nielsen, Ahlstrom and Mayor Romney emphasized that DADUs should serve as an opportunity to provide additional housing options and contribute to affordable housing, but in a way that is accessory to a main structure.

The council then provided their opinions regarding setbacks and size limitations. They expressed interest in establishing a size limitation, such as 1,500 square feet, reducing setbacks for DADUs. The council also agreed that the DADUs should remain accessory in nature and should not function or appear as a primary structure.

The planning commission will continue their work, including holding a public hearing, and make a final recommendation to the city council.

Regular Meeting

Mayor Romney called the meeting to order at 7:32 pm. James Ahlstrom gave an Invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Julie Thompson.

1. Approve Agenda

MOTION: *Jenn Nielsen made a motion to approve the agenda. Kelly Enquist seconded the Motion which PASSED by unanimous vote of all members present.*

2. Public Comment.

Don Guymon – 1641 N 600 W – Shared his concern over the County’s consideration of adopting a new transportation sales tax (the 5th 5th), and emphasized that they have been too many tax increases by governmental entities.

Ben Boothe – 1918 N 800 W – Stated that he was in attendance to represent the organization of Citizens of Tax Fairness. Shared his opposition to the proposed 5th 5th county tax increase.

Alan Malan – 772 W 1400 N – Shared his displeasure with the tax increase and the feasibility study for the Golf Course Clubhouse.

Corey Sweat – 1070 W 600 N – Shared his displeasure with the proposed Feasibility Study for the Golf Clubhouse.

3. Consider Letter of Support for Davis County “5th 5th” Local Option Sales Tax.

Mayor Romney explained the proposed county tax increase and its distribution formula. Of the proposed 0.20% increase, 0.05% would be allocated to the city for transportation, with the remaining portion going to the county. The estimated amount the city would receive from its portion of the increase was discussed, with projections of \$100,000 annually.

The council discussed the potential benefits to the city, as well as tax policy in general. The consensus was to take time to learn more about the tax before sending a letter of support.

MOTION: *James Ahlstrom made a motion to table the Letter of Support for Davis County “5th 5th” Local Option Sales Tax. Julie Thompson seconded the motion which PASSED.*

4. Consider Purchase Approval for Feasibility Study – Golf Course Clubhouse.

The council set a goal earlier this year of looking into the feasibility of replacing the existing clubhouse at the golf course. Duane negotiated a professional services agreement for a feasibility study with an architecture firm the city has used in the past. Duane reviewed the scope of the proposed study and explained the items that would be included. The council asked about procurement processes, and Duane responded that a contract for full architecture services in the future would go through an RFP process.

MOTION: *James Ahlstrom made a motion to approve the Purchase for a Feasibility Study – Golf Course Clubhouse for \$23,200. Jenn Nielsen seconded the motion which PASSED by unanimous vote of all members present.*

5. Meeting Minutes from August 4th, 2026.

MOTION: *James Ahlstrom made a motion to approve the meeting minutes from August 4th, 2026. Julie Thompson seconded the motion which PASSED by unanimous vote of all members present.*

6. Staff Reports

Police Department – Brandon Erikson

- Nothing to report.

Engineering – Kris Nilsen

- The year's seal coat project will begin soon, with the biggest portion of the project being 660 W.
- Will begin to design 700 N and 975 W road and water projects soon. Kris will work closely with Steve on designs.

Community Development/Administration – Duane Huffman

- Met with Bountiful City to discuss I-15 interchange landscape plans. UDOT is working on modifications based on that discussion
- Staff continues to meet with UTA regarding the double-track project. Before the second track can be installed, UTA will need to complete work on the canal. This work is expected to require the closure of Pages Lane for approximately three months.
- A part-time Administrative Assistant position is now advertised.

7. Mayor/Council Reports

James Ahlstrom:

- Nothing to report.

Kelly Enquist:

- Nothing to report.

Jenn Nielsen:

- Will meet with Wasatch Integrated Waste Management next week.
- Rough draft of the new YCC program was presented to Duane and Councilwoman Nielsen by the YCC Advisors. They will test this draft for the 2026-2027 year.

Julie Thompson:

- The Bike Parade for the America 250 Celebration will take place on Monday at the Park.

- Will be meeting with the local artist to discuss options for the mural following tonight's meeting.
 - Planning Commission approved a Conditional Use Permit for WinCo.
- Kenneth Romney:
- South Davis Metro Fire District swore in a new fire Chief.
